## Why train to teach?





## The rewards of teaching

- Go home each day knowing you've made a difference.
- Use your passion for your subject to inspire them.
- Make a difference in your community.
- A career where no two days are the same.





## The rewards of teaching

- A competitive starting salary.
- As a trainee teacher you'll get great support, including a mentor to build your confidence.
- A further two years of extra support as an early career teacher, including time out of the classroom for development.
- The teachers' pension scheme, one of the most generous in the country.
- More days holiday than many other professions.





### **Financial support**

There are three types of funding available for teacher training - depending on your circumstances, you could receive all three:

Tax-free bursary or scholarship.

Tuition fee loan and maintenance loan.

Extra financial support if you're a parent, have an adult dependant or a disability.

Or you could earn a salary while you train on a School Direct (salaried) course or postgraduate teaching apprenticeship (PGTA).





### How can I train to teach?





### **Teacher training courses**

- Usually take a year full-time to complete.
- Include plenty of classroom experience in at least two schools a minimum of 24 weeks of school experience.
- Offer training to meet the Teachers' Standards, which will include classroom management and making your subject accessible to your pupils
- Provide expert academic and practical guidance from mentors and tutors who are there to help you succeed.
- In addition to qualified teacher status (QTS) most courses will also offer a post graduate certificate in education (PGCE).





#### Finding the right teacher training course

- Training courses might be provided by a university, a school or a group of schools.

## Minimum entry requirements

GCSE grade C/grade 4 (or standard equivalent) in maths and English - and a science subject if you want to teach primary.

A UK undergraduate degree or a recognised equivalent qualification.





## Subject knowledge enhancement (SKE)

- SKE courses top up or refresh your existing subject knowledge
- they usually last between 8-28 weeks
- you could be eligible for a bursary to complete the course
- your training provider will identify if you need to take one as part of their selection process, usually at interview





### School experience

Getting classroom experience can help you to decide whether teaching is right for you - it could also strengthen your application.

Talk to teachers about day-to-day school life.

Observe teaching and pastoral work.

Watch a range of lessons and age groups being taught.

Remember to keep a reflective diary with you. Write about your observations. This information will be useful for your personal statement.

### How and when to apply

- Apply early, as course providers will fill their places as people apply throughout the year.
- You can apply via the GOV.UK service called Apply for teacher training.





#### Personal statement

- Your personal statement should convey energy, enthusiasm and a passion for teaching.
- Explain your reasons for wanting to teach and, more specifically, why you'll enjoy
  teaching your chosen subject and/or age group.
- What qualities do you have that will work well in the classroom communication, organisation and creativity are all important skills.
- What have you learnt during any school experience placements and how this has influenced your application?
- Explain how previous studies and work experience relate to your chosen subject or age group.

### **Teacher Training Advisers**

- A free service that provides you with additional support when preparing and applying for teacher training.
- A dedicated adviser who is an experienced teacher and knows the teacher training process inside out.
- Practical advice and guidance at each stage of your application, from writing your personal statement to preparing for interviews.
