


### **Easy Read**

# The Adult Social Care Negotiating Body



We want to make an organisation that recommends how much adult social care workers should be paid.



This will be called the **Adult Social Care Negotiating Body**. It will advise the government.

In the rest of this document, we will call it 'the **body**'.



**Negotiating** means agreeing on something.



These questions are about how we will set up the body.

A group of trade unions will work together. They will be led by an organisation called the **TUC**.

The TUC will have rules to help them decide who to involve.




Then they will tell the chair what they have decided.



This is because some people do lots of different jobs in a company.



Some people who work in adult social care work for themselves.

We want to make sure that these workers get paid fairly.




We could pay them separately for the work they do in each country.





These rules can be a big reason why some people leave their jobs or do not want to start.








The chair should try to solve the problem first.




If they cannot solve the problem, then we think an organisation called **Acas** should help.



**Acas** stands for the Advisory, Conciliation and Arbitration Service. They help to sort out problems at work.



They are used to sorting out problems where people cannot agree.



# Treating everyone fairly

**Protected characteristics** are personal details about you. There are examples on the next page.



It is against the law to treat people badly because of their protected characteristics.
