Independent Auditors' Report to the Members of Criminal Justice Workers Union

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Criminal Justice Workers Union (the 'Union') for the year ended 31 December 2024, which comprise the Income and expenditure statement, the Balance sheet and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the Executive Committee with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

Other information

The other information comprises the information included in the annual report other than the financial statements and our Auditors' report thereon. The Executive Committee are responsible for the other information contained within the annual report. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon. Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the course of the audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether this gives rise to a material misstatement in the financial statements themselves. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

Responsibilities of the Executive Committee

As explained more fully in the Executive Committee's responsibilities statement set out on page 1, the Executive Committee are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the Executive Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Executive Committee are responsible for assessing the Union's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Executive Committee either intend to liquidate the Union or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditors' responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an Auditors' report that includes our opinion. Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland.

Trade unions are governed by the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation Act) 1992. Under that act the accounts of Trade Unions are required to give a true and fair view. Therefore, the accounts are prepared under FRS 102, Section 1A. However, as a Trade Union is not a company, the regulations that form the foundation of disclosures under FRS 102 Section 1A have been adopted as considered necessary to ensure the accounts give a true and fair view to the members of the Trade Union.

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

1.2 Going concern

The Executive Committee assess whether the use of the going concern basis is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Union to continue as a going concern. They make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for the issue of the financial statements.

The Executive Committee have concluded that they have a reasonable expectation that the Union will be able to operate for the coming year, and so the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis. However, the Executive Committee have acknowledged that as a consequence of the weakened financial position at 31 December 2024, and potential downside forecasts for the year ahead, a material uncertainty exists.

The forecasts and cash flow requirements for the coming year have been carefully reviewed, and whilst these indicate the Union is predicted to make a modest surplus over this period, and cash reserves will remain steady and positive, there are inherent vulnerabilities linked to the uncertainty over income levels and possible rising costs which could impact on the Union's ability to continue as a going concern.

1.3 Membership subscriptions

Membership subscriptions are accounted for on an accruals basis.

1.4 Pensions

Defined contribution pension plan

The Union operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Union pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the Union has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in profit or loss when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the Balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the Union in independently administered funds.

1.5 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets under the cost model are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.5 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual value over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method.

Depreciation is provided on the following basis:

Office equipment - 20%

The assets' residual values, useful lives and depreciation methods are reviewed, and adjusted prospectively if appropriate, or if there is an indication of a significant change since the last reporting date.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in profit or loss.
