Explanatory Notes

The following notes are supplied to help you complete the Application for Centre Licences in connection with Bovine Semen Collection.

1. Who can apply?

Applications should be completed by the proposed licensee or their agent. A detailed plan (including dimensions) of the proposed centre must accompany the application form.

2. Minimum Requirements:

All bovine quarantine centres approved for trade to Member States of the EU should:

- Be constructed or isolated so that contact with livestock outside is prevented, or be isolated
- Be constructed so that the animal housing can be readily cleaned and disinfected
- Have bovine animal housing including isolation facilities that have no direct communication with the normal animal housing.

3. How long does it take to get approved?

A minimum period of six weeks is normally required for completion of policy and veterinary checks.

4. Types of approval for bovines:

- (a) Quarantine premises for animals
- (b) Semen collection centre which includes the following:
 - Animal housing and isolation
 - Collection facilities
 - Processing facilities and
 - Semen quarantine room
- (c) Storage centre.

All centres must be inspected by an APHA Veterinarian before a licence is issued.

5. How much does it cost?

Fixed administrative costs incurred for processing applications and additional charges for APHA Veterinarian's time and travel costs are published on GOV.UK.

Once services have been provided, an invoice will be raised which should be paid within 28 days of receipt.

APHA is an Executive Agency of the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and also works on behalf of the Scottish Government, Welsh Government and Food Standards Agency to safeguard animal and plant health for the benefit of people, the environment and the economy.
