

INDICTMENT

IN THE CROWN COURT AT SOUTHWARK

THE KING v. ULTRA ELECTRONICS HOLDINGS LIMITED

charged as follows: -

Count 1

STATEMENT OF OFFENCE

Failure of a commercial organisation to prevent bribery, contrary to section 7 of the Bribery Act 2010.

PARTICULARS OF OFFENCE

Between the 1st of July 2011 and the 1st of October 2012, Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited failed to prevent persons associated with Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited from bribing officials concerned in the award of the Main Contract 6 Project for Muscat and Salalah Airports in the Sultanate of Oman, where the said bribery was intended to obtain or retain business or an advantage in the conduct of business for Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited.

Count 2

STATEMENT OF OFFENCE

Failure of a commercial organisation to prevent bribery, contrary to section 7 of the Bribery Act 2010.

PARTICULARS OF OFFENCE

Between 1st of May 2016 and 31st of August 2017, Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited failed to prevent persons associated with Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited from bribing others in order to secure a project for Information Technology and E-commerce solutions at the Houari Boumediene Airport in Algeria, where the said bribery was intended to obtain or retain business or an advantage in the conduct of business for Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited.

Count 3

STATEMENT OF OFFENCE

Failure of a commercial organisation to prevent bribery, contrary to section 7 of the Bribery Act 2010.

PARTICULARS OF OFFENCE

Between 1st of July 2016 and 31st of July 2017, Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited failed to prevent persons associated with Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited from bribing others in order to secure a project for the provision of public key infrastructure works for the Algerian Ministry of Post and Information and Communication Technologies, where the said bribery was intended to obtain or retain business or an advantage in the conduct of business for Ultra Electronics Holdings Limited.
