<p>Arts Care Limited</p>	<p>This initiative is a collaborative partnership between Arts Care (Northern Ireland) and Equal Arts (North East England), running from 1 April 2026 to 31 March 2027. The project addresses the inconsistent access to creative programming within care homes and supported living settings, specifically for older people and those living with dementia.</p> <p>The programme is built on evidence that artistic participation significantly improves health, wellbeing, and social connection for isolated populations. <p>Building Communities Resource Centre</p>	<p>Community Voices East-West is a collaborative initiative between the Building Communities Resource Centre (BCRC), based in Northern Ireland (Causeway Coast and Glens), and the Crossroads Youth and Community Association in Glasgow, Scotland.</p> <p>The project is designed to facilitate structured East-West dialogue and joint place-based learning events, bringing together community leaders from both regions. By creating safe and constructive spaces for engagement, the partnership aims to explore shared social and economic pressures, foster mutual understanding, and build enduring civic connections across the United Kingdom. <p>East Belfast Community Development Agency</p>	<p>The project aims to build the capacity, skills, networks, and relationships of 11 emerging leaders from the community and voluntary sector in East Belfast. This will be achieved by providing them with greater insight into community development practice outside of Northern Ireland, specifically through a study visit to London.</p> <p>The goal is to facilitate positive and constructive dialogue on shared challenges facing communities across the UK (such as poverty, housing, and demographic change). <p>Environmental Justice Network Ireland</p>	<p>The goal is to establish options for the creation of an East/West Environmental Rights Forum. <p>Go-Woman Alliance Community Interest Company</p>	<p>Strong Enough To Share is a collaborative initiative between the Go-Woman Alliance Community Interest Company (GOAL) and Kilcooley Women’s Centre. <p>Kabosh</p>	<p>Not On Our Watch' is an expanded UK-wide touring programme led by the Belfast-based theatre company Kabosh, in partnership with Unite the Union Women's Committees across England, Scotland, and Wales. Running from 4 May 2026 to 1 February 2027, the project builds on a successful pilot to deepen East-West civic collaboration and solidarity.</p> <p>The initiative uses theatre as a catalyst for dialogue on gender equality, social justice, and workplace rights. <p>Northern Ireland Rural Women's Network</p>	<p>This project is a strategic partnership led by the Northern Ireland Rural Women's Network (NIRWN) in collaboration with Derry Well Women and The Women's Organisation. Running as a follow-up to an initial exploratory phase, this initiative focuses on addressing persistent inequalities in women's access to healthcare and their limited influence over health system design in both England and Northern Ireland.</p> <p>The programme uniquely bridges the gap between grassroots lived experience and high-level policy by involving the England Women's Health Strategy Partnership and representatives from the Department of Health.
