HUMBLE ADDRESS: APPOINTMENT OF LORD MANDELSON AS HM AMBASSADOR TO WASHINGTON

That an Humble Address be presented to His Majesty, that he will be graciously pleased to give directions to require the Government to lay before this House all papers relating to Lord Mandelson's appointment as His Majesty's Ambassador to the United States of America, including but not confined to the Cabinet Office due diligence which was passed to Number 10, the Conflict of Interest Form Lord Mandelson provided to the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), material the FCDO and the Cabinet Office provided to UK Security Vetting about Lord Mandelson's interests in relation to Global Counsel, including his work in relation to Russia and China, and his links to Jeffrey Epstein, papers for, and minutes of, meetings relating to the decision to appoint Lord Mandelson, electronic communications between the Prime Minister's Chief of Staff and Lord Mandelson, and between ministers and Lord Mandelson, in the six months prior to his appointment, minutes of meetings between Lord Mandelson and ministers in the six months prior to his appointment, all information on Lord Mandelson provided to the Prime Minister prior to his assurance to this House on 10 September 2025 that 'full due process was followed during this appointment', electronic communications and minutes of all meetings between Lord Mandelson and ministers, Government officials and special advisers during his time as Ambassador, and the details of any payments made to Lord Mandelson on his departure as Ambassador and from the Civil Service except papers prejudicial to UK national security or international relations which shall instead be referred to the Intelligence and Security Committee of Parliament.

GOVERNMENT METHODOLOGY IN COMPLYING WITH THE HUMBLE ADDRESS

Summary

1. In order to provide transparency to Parliament and the public, below is set out the process by which the Government gathered, processed and published material in relation to the Humble Address of 4 February 2026. This includes the publication of Volume I on 11 March and this publication of Volume II.
2. The scope of the motion is very broad and has required the discovery, assessment, analysis and preparation of thousands of individual documents and messages. This is a task that has involved every Government department and goes far beyond the scope of any Freedom of Information Act request or Parliamentary Question. From the beginning it was recognised that the Government's response would be more similar in scale to a public inquiry. In addition, it has been necessary for the Government to navigate the added complexity of an ongoing police investigation, which it has been consistently clear it will not prejudice in its response to the Humble Address.
3. The Government's guiding principle in responding to the Humble Address has been to comply as fully and transparently as possible with the motion and Parliament's will, as swiftly as possible. Other than the redaction of individual email addresses and contact details, the majority of redactions are those which the Government has agreed with the Intelligence and Security Committee of Parliament (ISC). The only other redactions made outside the ISC process have been where there is a clear rationale, informed by the FOI Act or other legal frameworks, and in line with the clear precedent set by previous administrations. The application of such redactions has been deliberately limited, targeted, and the subject of detailed consideration on a line-by-line basis. The reasons for redaction have been clearly marked.
4. The Government has invited and received comprehensive assurance at every stage of this process, from making the initial decisions on scope, to the minutiae of specific redactions. This includes advice from leading Counsel on the principles followed and the detailed underpinning methodology, and the Chair of the Public Administration and Constitutional Affairs Committee reviewing the information which has been withheld in order not to prejudice the ongoing Metropolitan Police Service investigation.
5. The result is the largest ever Government response to a Humble Address. It represents thousands of hours of work from officials across the Government to deliver an unprecedented piece of Government transparency.

Commissioning

6. A disclosure exercise of this size required multiple commissions to every government department, in order that the Government could be assured that it was discharging Parliament's will. These are explained below.

7. To prepare the first volume of published material, an initial set of documents relevant to the appointment and withdrawal of Peter Mandelson was provided to the Cabinet Office Humble Address team by the Prime Minister's Office, following which the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) was commissioned to provide further specific documents relating to Peter Mandelson's appointment and withdrawal. These documents were subject to the same series of checks as outlined below.
8. In addition, all Government departments (including the Prime Minister's Office) received an instruction to retain all potentially relevant information shortly after the Humble Address motion was passed, to ensure that nothing in scope of the motion would be lost before departments were formally commissioned.
9. On 23 February, the the Senior Responsible Officer (SRO - the Permanent Secretary to the Cabinet Office) commissioned all departments to search for and return all electronic communications and minutes of meetings in scope of the Humble Address, in order to return information mainly within scope of the limbs of the motion concerned with messages and meetings during Peter Mandelson's tenure as Ambassador and the six preceding months. This focused on obtaining electronic communications directly between Peter Mandelson and Ministers, Pay Band 3/4 Special Advisers, Permanent Secretaries and Directors General, and minutes of meetings between those same individuals, where they were the principal attendees, rather than where they were one member among wider cast lists (for example not including formal committee meetings such as COBR or the NSC). This did not include wider groups or distribution lists, therefore excluding FCDO Diplomatic Telegrams, regional updates, thematic notes and briefing materials, press lines, corporate updates and newsletters.
10. In addition to this request, a further specific commission was made to the FCDO on 24 February, in order to target information in scope of the limbs of the motion most relevant to the FCDO. This included information relating to Peter Mandelson's withdrawal and severance.
11. Departments were asked to provide assurance on their returns on 6 March, in order that the central Humble Address team could be sure that all relevant information had been collected and to understand where further commissions may be required.
12. Departments were asked to undertake a search for any further non-corporate communications on 13 March, given the significant interest in this limb of the motion. This commission specified that all relevant non-corporate communications, except where they were purely personal in nature (for example relating to family matters or medical information), were required to be shared with the Cabinet Office. This included group messages.
13. A commission was sent to departments on 27 March which provided a further opportunity to share any additional material that departments believed should be considered in scope of the Humble Address motion. The commission also requested confirmation from departments that their initial return had captured all minutes of

meetings in scope. Such confirmation would be taken to mean that departments had cross-referred to specific individuals' calendars as well as their inboxes.

14. There were two specific commissions to relevant departments to check that all material relating to Peter Mandelson's National Security Vetting had been returned, on 21 April and 8 May.
15. Departmental Permanent Secretaries were responsible for assuring the Cabinet Office that they had taken reasonable steps to comply with the commissions and provide all relevant information. Departments were responsible for contacting all relevant current and former Ministers, Special Advisers and officials in their departments in scope of the request. Throughout the process there was an ongoing dialogue between the central team and departments, with specific sessions held with relevant private office officials to answer any questions.
16. Where individuals in scope had subsequently left the Government, the department which last employed them was responsible for contacting them and assuring their return. Where Ministers had occupied other Ministerial posts in the period between the six months prior to Peter Mandelson's appointment as HMA Washington and the date of the Humble Address motion, the Minister's current department was responsible for contacting the departments where that Minister had previously served.
17. The Cabinet Office Humble Address team used a secure portal to process returns from departments. These returns were instructed to be unredacted and undoctored.

Scope of searches

18. In order that the Government could respond swiftly and transparently to discharge the spirit and letter of the Humble Address, search parameters were included based on the limbs of the Humble Address motion. These were as follows:
 - a. Individuals in scope of the limbs of the motion seeking direct correspondence with Peter Mandelson (via email and other electronic messages) were specified as all Ministers, Pay Band 3/4 Special Advisers, Permanent Secretaries and Directors General. This was on the basis that these were the individuals most likely to have come into contact with Peter Mandelson.
 - b. These individuals were instructed to search their work devices and personal devices for any relevant information.
 - c. Minutes of meetings between those same individuals and Peter Mandelson where they were the principal attendees were requested, not where they were one member among wider cast lists (for example not including formal committee meetings such as the National Security Council).
 - d. Electronic messages involving Peter Mandelson that were exchanged as part of a group were requested, as well as those directly between an in-scope individual and Peter Mandelson.
19. While commissions to departments did not specifically request invitations to meetings or schedulers from individuals' calendars, where these have been provided to the

Cabinet Office Humble Address team and where relevant, they have been included in the publication.

20. Some material has been included in the publication where it does not meet the above criteria but includes content relevant to areas where Parliament has expressed a significant interest, such as Peter Mandelson's campaign to become Chancellor of Oxford University. Material of a party political nature is included in the publication, contrary to usual practice and precedent for information 'held' by the Government, in order to demonstrate the maximum possible transparency.
21. Some information was deemed out of scope via the commissioning process so as to keep the returns focused on the most relevant information:
 - a. Obvious ephemera - for example press cuttings, out of office replies, FCDO internal corporate messaging.
 - b. Anything which was clearly related to the corporate management of British Embassy Washington (e.g. FCDO personnel decisions and discussions, individual performance reporting, embassy staffing and management plans, estate issues).
 - c. Routine Embassy business (such as consular work and copylists containing FCDO Diplomatic Telegrams, regional updates, thematic notes and briefing materials, press lines, corporate updates and newsletters).
 - d. Purely personal information that would not usually be considered 'held' by the Government (for example relating to family matters or medical information).
22. On 31 March the SRO wrote to Peter Mandelson - via his solicitors - to request any information held on his personal phone. Peter Mandelson declined to comply with this request. The Government has no further recourse to search the personal devices of Peter Mandelson.

Cabinet Office assessment

23. All documents submitted to the Cabinet Office underwent a series of checks including:
 - An assessment to determine whether the material submitted was in scope of the Humble Address motion.
 - A first stage assessment to determine whether material contained information which may prejudice UK national security or international relations. Where so, it was subject to a further process as outlined below.
 - A team of Civil Service reviewers conducted checks to examine whether the documents contained: junior officials' names; legally privileged information; third party information; commercially sensitive information; or, personal data (e.g. phone numbers or email addresses). Such material was flagged for potential redaction ahead of final publication.
 - A review team of senior officials, overseen by the SRO, has made the final

decisions on scope, commissioning, and fine judgements on specific principles and documents.

24. As the Government has consistently set out, documents have been withheld from publication if they could potentially prejudice the ongoing Metropolitan Police Service investigation. As set out below, these are intended to be published at a later date.

National security and international relations

25. The motion required that any papers prejudicial to national security or international relations would be referred to the ISC. Consequently, a subset of the material above was subject to an additional process to comply with that aspect.
26. Although the ISC was operating under the authority of the Humble Address in fulfilling this task (as opposed to its normal statutory remit), the process largely followed the usual process for requesting and agreeing national security redactions (although in this case, the ISC was also agreeing to international relations redactions as well as those relating to national security). Departments were asked to indicate where their searches identified material that would be prejudicial to either national security or international relations (or both). Departments then prepared pro formas that specified the text which required redaction, and the rationale for requesting that redaction. The pro formas, alongside the unredacted documents, were submitted to the ISC to seek their approval. In undertaking this process departments were supported by the National Security Secretariat for national security material, and the FCDO for international relations material. Over 300 documents were submitted to the ISC to seek their approval for the Government's proposed redactions.
27. Following the initial process, the Government and the ISC were in agreement on a number of the redaction decisions. The remaining documents were subject to a contested redactions process with a hearing held between senior officials and the ISC. This hearing led to the successful resolution of redactions relating to all of the remaining documents.
28. The ISC's statement of 15 May makes clear that it has considered all redactions proposed in the documents referred to the Committee, in order not to prejudice UK national security or international relations. The decisions determined by the Committee were final following the contested redaction hearing on 14 May. The Government is extremely grateful to the Committee for their work.

Preparation for publication

29. Following these processes, the Cabinet Office Humble Address team prepared the documents for publication. The documents include a mixture of emails, submissions, hard-copy files, and electronic messages such as WhatsApps, some of which required formatting choices to be applied for intelligibility.
30. WhatsApp and other instant messages were transcribed in a standard format to ensure intelligibility. Where material such as WhatsApp messages was submitted to the Humble Address team with incomplete details (for instance regarding dates), the

Cabinet Office Humble Address team followed up with departments to request the remaining material. Material has been published with the maximum amount of available information, and some messages which are not strictly in scope of the motion have been included in order to provide context, where such context was necessary, or where they respond to particular areas of interest from Parliament.

31. Documents have been de-classified to enable publication. Where documents show a classification marking, this no longer applies.
32. The publication is structured according to each limb of the motion. Within this, documents are ordered chronologically.

Redactions

33. It is a longstanding practice across successive administrations that, when the Government responds to a Humble Address motion, it has a responsibility to consider whether it is in the public interest to place certain information into the public domain. In line with practice across successive administrations, this is done using the principles of the Freedom of Information Act, and in line with the Ministerial Code and the resolutions on ministerial accountability, passed by both Houses in 1997 which state that "*ministers should be as open as possible with Parliament, refusing to provide information only when disclosure would not be in the public interest, which should be decided in accordance with relevant statute.*"
34. As set out above, the Government's overriding priority in responding to the Humble Address has been to respond fully, transparently and swiftly in order to meet the will of the House. Clearly, the scale of the Humble Address disclosure goes far beyond any usual Freedom of Information Act or other transparency request. However, the principles the Freedom of Information Act sets out have been used by previous administrations when responding to such motions - for example when responding to Humble Addresses relating to Radox and the Westferry Printworks. That means that, outside the process for managing papers prejudicial to UK national security or international relations, a number of targeted, specific redactions have been made in order to prevent real-world harms.
35. Specifically, these targeted redactions are in order to protect:
 - a. Individuals' email addresses and phone numbers;
 - b. The identities of junior civil servants;
 - c. Third party data - including the personal or commercially sensitive data of third parties not relevant to the motion; and
 - d. Legal professional privilege.
36. A small amount of Peter Mandelson's personal data has also been redacted: his signature and the location of his home.
37. In the interests of transparency, third party individuals who are considered to be public figures have been named. Third parties who have a reasonable expectation of privacy, because they are not public figures, have not been named. No references to current or former UK politicians have been redacted on the basis of their being third

parties. Publication of the names of political figures from countries other than the USA has been limited to world leaders.

38. There has been particular public interest in information involving Global Counsel and Palantir. No redactions have been made to references to Global Counsel, other than to protect the privacy of individuals who are not public figures - their connection to Global Counsel has been made clear in those emails. References to Palantir and Anduril have only been redacted in cases where the redaction has been agreed with the ISC, i.e. on the grounds of being information that is prejudicial to UK national security or international relations.
39. Some company names other than Global Counsel and Palantir have been redacted where this is not relevant to the motion. The Government does not consider it to be in the interests of the taxpayer to damage the Government's relationship with companies, to damage ongoing Government commercial negotiations, or to potentially damage those companies' commercial prospects, if they are not relevant to the motion.
40. Where material that has been submitted to the Cabinet Office Humble Address team is already in the public domain, no redactions have been applied to that material.
41. The redaction process has been overseen by the Cabinet Office and, where relevant, in conjunction with the ISC. No Government Minister or Special Adviser has determined any of the redactions.
42. The following labels have been used for redactions in Volume II:
 - a. Redactions made with the agreement of the ISC have been labelled with asterisks '(***)
 - b. All email addresses and phone numbers have been redacted with the label 'PERSONAL'
 - c. A small amount of personal data contained in the body of documents has also been redacted with the label 'PERSONAL'
 - d. All junior civil servants' names have been redacted with the label 'JCS'
 - e. Third party material not relevant to the motion and relating to individuals who are not public figures have been redacted with the label 'THIRD PARTY'
 - f. Information relating to companies, where disclosure of the information would be commercially damaging, has been redacted with the label 'THIRD PARTY'
 - g. Material attracting legal professional privilege has been redacted with the label 'LPP'

Independent assurance

- 44. The Government has taken several measures to ensure independent, external assurance of the process it has followed.
- 45. The Senior Responsible Owner has taken advice from leading Counsel, senior Government lawyers, and other Government experts throughout this process.
- 46. As confirmed by Ministers to Parliament, the Chair of the Public Administration and Constitutional Affairs Committee, Simon Hoare MP, has reviewed information that has been withheld from publication on the basis of not wishing to prejudice the ongoing Metropolitan Police Service investigation, in order to provide as much transparency to Parliament as possible, albeit in a closed setting.
- 47. Finally, the Cabinet Office Humble Address team has taken advice from an independent Kings Counsel - including reviewing the methodological approach followed by officials - and acted on that to inform their approach. This has helped ensure that the Government is confident that its approach is compliant with the Humble Address and the Government's legal obligations.

Police process and third publication

- 48. The Government has now discharged its duties under the Humble Address when it comes to identifying relevant material within scope of the motion and preparing it for publication. With the exception of the material being withheld in order not to prejudice the ongoing Metropolitan Police Service investigation, all these documents have now been published in either Volume I or II. There will be a final publication by the Government at the conclusion of the Metropolitan Police Service investigation, or before, if the Metropolitan Police Service confirms that doing so will not prejudice their investigation.

President Trump addressed the media at the round table discussion with EU leaders and Zelensky ahead of their Ukraine/Russia peace talks today at 2.50pm EST. He mentioned his friendship and liking of British Prime Minister Kier Starmer. He also mentioned that they would spend a lot of time today trying to work out a resolution and that he would call President Putin afterwards. Zelensky then spoke about wanting the end to the war and about security guarantees and humanitarian results. All participants were invited to speak making a short statement about what they hope to achieve today and what they can offer. In order they were: Nato Sec Rutter, President of the European Commission Von der Leyen, German Chancellor Merz, Italian Prime Minister Meloni, French President Macron, British Prime Minister Kier Starmer (highlighted in yellow below), Finnish President Stubb.

Transcript

Trump

Thank you for all the wonderful things we have done today, we are all here for the same thing to end the killing and stop the war in Ukraine. We're all working for the same goal, very simple goal. We want to stop the killing, get this settled. I've just had the honor of being with President zelensky and all of the discussions that we've had, we covered a lot of territory, and I spoke indirectly with President Putin today. We're going to call President Putin right after this meeting. I'm sure we're going to have a solid meeting, good meeting, maybe a great meeting. And we're going to try and work out a trilateral after that and see if we can get it finished. Put this to sleep, because this is not since the Second World War has there been anything like this. So I'm honored to welcome NATO Secretary General, Mark Ruffalo, who's a great gentleman, great, great political leader in Europe generally, but now he's the NATO Secretary General, and you're doing

a fantastic job. Thank you very much, Mark, Prime Minister Starmer of the United Kingdom, our friend and my friend, and doing really well. And people like him a lot. We all like him. Everyone knows President Macron of France, who's been with me from the beginning, one of the first people I met as a foreign dignitary, and I liked him from day one, and I like him even more now. That's pretty good. That's unusual. That's a pretty unusual thing. Prime Minister Maloney of Italy, who's a really great leader and an inspiration over there, she's she's served now, even though she's a very young person, she's served there for a long period of time. Relative to others, they don't last very long. You've lasted a long time, you're going to be there a long time. Chancellor Mertz of Germany, who is very strong person and a very strong leader and very highly respected in Germany, and he's my friend, and it's an honor to have him as my friend. Thank you very much. Very good. You look great with your tan. Where'd you get that tan? I want to, I want to get a tan like that President stub of Finland, and he's, uh, he's somebody that, where are we here? Huh? We're, we're Oh, you look better than I've ever seen you look, but you've done a great job, and we wanted to have you here because you're somebody that we all respect, and you've had a lot to do with the success, I think, and the potential success. And thank you very much for being here. We appreciate it. And the President of the European Commission, Ursula von der Leyen, who is somebody that we just made a big deal with, with all of those countries, I don't know. I think you might be more powerful than all these guys at this table. I don't know, but you, we had a great negotiation, and you're respected all over the world. So I want to thank you very much for being here. It's a great honor to have you. The Alaska summit reinforced my belief that while difficult pieces within reach, and I believe that in a very significant step, President Putin agreed that Russia would accept security guarantees for Ukraine, and this is one of the key points that we need to consider, and we're going to be considering that at the table also, like, who will do what? Essentially, I'm optimistic that collectively, we can reach an agreement that would deter any future aggression against Ukraine, and I actually think there won't be. I think that's even overrated, largely overrated, but we're going to find out, and I think that the European nations are going to take a lot of the burden. We're going to help them, and we're going to make it very secure. We also need to discuss the possible exchanges of territory, taking into consideration the current line of contact. That means the war zone, the war lines that are pretty obvious, very sad actually, to look at them and negotiating positions President Putin. Also you have President of Ukraine. Who is? You just met a little while ago, and we're going to try and get a three party meeting, maybe as soon as we can. And I have a feeling you and President Putin are going to work something out. Ultimately, this is a decision that can only be made by President zelenskyy and by the people of Ukraine working also together in agreement with President Putin. And I just think that's very good things are going to come of it. So I hope we have a good meeting, and if we can have a good meeting, I'll set up a meeting with President Putin, and if you'd like, I'll go to that meeting. And not that I want to do that, but I will do that because we want to save a lot of people from dying. A lot of people are dying, and we got to save them. Got to save it. Five. 1000, 6000, 7000 people, sometimes a week. All of us would obviously prefer an immediate cease fire while we work on a lasting peace and maybe something like that could happen as of this moment. It's not happening, but President zelenskyy and President Putin can talk a little bit more about that. You know, in the six or so wars that we stopped, we haven't had a cease fire, and so I don't know that it's necessary. You can do it through the war, but it would be, I like the cease fire from another standpoint, you immediately stop the killing. But I believe a peace agreement at the end of all of this is something that's very attainable and it can be done in the near future, with all of the wars that I got involved in, we we only have this one left. Of course, as I walk out the door, there'll probably be a new one starting, and I'll get that stopped too. But I thought this was going to be one of the easier ones. It's actually one of the most difficult. They're very complex. The next step would be for a trilateral meeting, and that will be worked out. And I just look forward to working and having a great result. We're going to spend a lot of time today talking about and we're really honored you guys came over. I mean, these are the heads of major countries and respected all over Europe, and they speak for largely, I think I should say, but pretty much for the other countries of Europe, and we will come to a resolution today, I think, on almost everything, including probably the security. And that's pretty much a story. I'd like to say, Mr. President, would you like to say something you have the media if you want. You could come over and you could stand you could use mine, or you could just turn around, whichever you feel comfortable with.

Zelensky:

Thanks so much. I can speak without microphone. Thank you so much. I think that we had very good conversation with President Trump, very good. And it really was the best one. Or, sorry, maybe the best one will be in the future. But it was really good, and we spoke about very sensitive points. The first one is security guarantees, and we are very happy with President that all the leaders are here, and security in Ukraine depends on the United States and on you and on those leaders who are with us in our hearts, they have been on online before yesterday and etc. So a lot of countries on the side of Ukraine, our people and all of us want to finish this war. Stop So Russia, stop this war. We spoke about it, and we will speak more about security guarantees. This is very important that United States gives such strong signal and is ready for security guarantees the second point, or maybe the first humanitarian direction, very important to exchange all the prisoners. And I think that President will help. And I was very thankful to be your wife again, Mr. President, for the letter about our abducted children. And I hope that really, it can be historical for the people to bring kids back to the families and be happy, guys. This is so, so important, and I'm happy that we discussed it this track with President Trump, and I hope that we will find decisions and then what is very important that all the sensitive things, territorial, etc, we will discuss on the level of leaders during trilateral meeting, and President Trump will try to organize such meeting. And he said that he will come or not come, Ukraine will be happy. If you, if you there, I will be there. Yeahthank you. And I think this is very important, yes. So security guarantees, bringing kids back and all our people, not only warriors, first of all, warriors, and all the civilians, journalists, a lot of people in prison, so we need them back and guarantees which will work for the years. We spoke about it, and I showed the President a lot of details on the battlefield, on the map. Thank you so much. Thank you for the map. By the way, that was great. I'm thinking how to take it back. I think that we had constructive, specific meeting, and I'm very thankful to all the all the leaders who are here, and you help a lot. And so we're happy that we have such big unity today.

Trump:

Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you very much, Mr. President. I think you'll see that President Putin really would like to do something else. I think when we set that up, when we do, I think it's going to be when not if. I think you're going to see some very popular. Really positive moves. I know there's over 1000 prisoners, and I know they're going to release them. Maybe they're going to release them very soon, like immediately, which I think is great, but we will. We're going to set that up today, after these, after this meeting. So very good and great remarks. I appreciate it. Marcus, head of NATO, maybe you could say a few words.

Mark Rutte

Yes, I will be very brief. I really want to thank you, President of the United States, Dear Donald, for the fact that you, as I said before, broke the deadlock basically with President Putin by starting that dialog. And I think it was in February that you had the first phone call. And from there, we are now where we are today. And that is, I think if we play this well, we could end this, and we have to end it. We have to stop the killing. We have to stop the destruction of Ukraine's infrastructure. It is a terrible war. So I'm really excited, and let's make the best out of today and make sure that from today onwards, we get this thing to an end as soon as possible. I really want to thank you for your leadership, what you are doing for Logan here. But of course, also all the European colleagues, it is really crucial. And the fact that you have said I am willing to participate in security guarantees is a big step. Is really a breakthrough, and it makes all the difference. So also thank you for that.

Trump:

Well, NATO also has agreed from 2% to 5% which is something that is a massive amount of money, and it's 2% that wasn't always paid to 5% that is paid. That's a big difference, and so we appreciate that as great move. Thank you very much. Ursula, maybe on behalf of the commission, you could say a couple of words,

Ursula Von De Leyen

thank you very much. It's a pleasure to be here, and it's a very important moment. Indeed. We are here, Europeans as friends and allies. We had a fantastic NATO summit together the two largest and biggest economies in the world. We had the largest trade deal ever agreed, and now we are here to work together with you on a just and lasting peace for Ukraine, stop the killing. This is really our common interest, stop the killing. And indeed, it's very good to hear that we're working on the security guarantees. Article Five lies. Security guarantees so important. But I want to thank you also that you mentioned the 1000s of Ukrainian children that have been abducted, and as a mother and grandmother, every single child has to go back to its family. This should be one of our main priorities, also in these negotiations, to make sure that the children come back to Ukraine to their families. Thank

Trump

you. And we did. I was just thinking, we're here for a different reason, but we, just a couple of weeks ago, made the largest trade deal in history. So that's a big that's a big thing, and congratulations. That's great. Thank you very much, Mr. Chancellor from Germany, a very, very great leader, Mr.

Friedrich Merz

President Donald, many thanks for having us today. I think this is extremely helpful that we are meeting and hearing that the two of you are having such a good meeting today here in Washington. The next steps ahead are the more complicated ones. Now the path is open. You opened it last Friday, but now the way is open for complicated negotiations, and to be honest, we all would like to see a ceasefire. The latest from the next meeting on, I can't imagine that the next meeting would take place without a ceasefire. So let's work on that, and let's try to put pressure on Russia, because the credibility of these efforts, these efforts we are undertaking today, are depending on at least a ceasefire from the beginning of the serious negotiations from next step on. So I would like to emphasize this aspect, and would like to see a ceasefire from the next meeting, which should be a trilateral meeting, wherever it takes place.

Trump:

Well, we're going to let the President go over and talk to the President, and we'll see how that works out. And if we can do that, I will say and again, I say it in the six wars that I've settled, I haven't had a cease fire. We just got into negotiations, and they one of the wars was, as you know, and the Congo was 30 years, 31 years long. Another one that we settled last week with two great countries was 35 years going on, and we had no ceasefire. So if we can do the ceasefire, great, and if we don't do a ceasefire, because many other points were given to us, many, many points were given to us. Great points, please, Georgia, go ahead.

Georgia Meloni

Well. Thank you very much. Donald, Mr. President, for hosting us today in this important meeting. And I think it is an important day, a new phase after three years and off. That we didn't see any kind of sign from the Russian side that there was a willing for dialog. So something is changing. Something has changed. Thanks to you, thanks also to the stalling in the battlefield, which was achieved with the bravery of Ukraine, of Ukrainians, and with the unity that we all provided to Ukraine. And the reason why I mention it is that we also have to remind that if we want to reach peace, and if we want to guarantee justice, we have to do it united. So that's why it's a very good day, the one we are in you can obviously count on Italy, as it was from the beginning, we are on the side of Ukraine, and we do absolutely support your efforts towards peace. We will talk about many important topics. The first one is security guarantees, how to be sure that it won't happen again, which is the precondition of every kind of peace. I'm happy that we will discuss about that. I'm happy that we will begin from a proposal which is the, let's say, Article Five, model, which was Italian at the beginning. So we are always ready to bring our proposals for peace, for dialog, it's something we have to build together to guarantee peace and to defend the security of our nation. So thank you, Mr. President for hosting us.

Trump

Thank you very much, Emmanuel,

Emmanuel Macron

thank you, Mr. President, for organizing this, this meeting and for your commitment, and everything was said. But I have to, I just have to say here, everybody around this table is in favor of peace and and we work very hard, and we've worked very hard during the past few years to have a peace which is a robust and long standing peace. This is why the idea of a trilateral meeting is very important, because this is the only way to fix it. And by the way, I think as a follow up, we would need probably a quadrilateral meeting. Because when we speak about security guarantees, we speak about the whole security of the European continent. And this is why we are all united here with Ukraine on this, on this matter, in order to organize such a trilateral meeting, your idea to ask for a truce, or at least to stop the killings, as we discuss, is a necessity, and we all support this idea. And in order to have such a long standing peace for Ukraine and for the whole continent. We do need the security guarantees. And the first one is clearly a credible Ukrainian army for the years and

decades to come. And the second one is our own commitments, all of us, and we worked very hard during the past few months amongst the coalition of the willingness, with the support of NATO, to build the different pillars of security guarantees and our commitments. And you can be sure that Europeans are very lucid about the fact that they have their fair share in these security guarantees for Ukraine, but their own security is clearly at stake in the situation. So you can count on us, as we can continue in order to deliver this August peace for both Ukraine and Europe.

Trump

Thank you very much, Emmanuel, Mr. Prime Minister. Thank

Kier Starmer

you very much, Mr. President, and thank you for hosting us here. Can I start where Emmanuel started, which is we all want peace. The war in Ukraine has had a huge impact, particularly on the Ukrainians who bought the brunt of it, but it's also had an impact on Europe and on the United Kingdom. There's not a family or community that hasn't been affected. And when we talk about security, we're talking about security not just of Ukraine. We're talking about the security of Europe, but the United Kingdom as well, which is why this is such an important issue. Things is such an important meeting as a group. I think we've had a discussion on the phone a number of times, Mr. President, but be able now to be around the table to take it forward. And I really feel that we can, I think, with the right approach, this afternoon, make real progress, particularly on the security guarantees and your indication of security guarantees of some sort of Article, five style guarantees fits with what we've been doing with the Coalition of the Willing, which we started some months ago, bringing countries together and showing that we were prepared to step up to the plate when it came to security. With you coming alongside the US, alongside what we have already developed, I think we could take a really important step forward today, a historic step actually could come out of this meeting in terms of security for Ukraine and security in Europe. I also feel that we can make real progress towards a just and lasting outcome of. Obviously that has to involve Ukraine, and a trilateral meeting seems the sensible next step. So thank you for being prepared to take that forward. Because I think if we can ensure that that is the progress out of this meeting, both security guarantees and some sort of progress on trilateral meeting of some sort to bring some of the difficult issues to a head. Then I think today will be seen as a very important day in recent years in relation to a conflict which has gone on for three and a bit years, and so far, nobody, nobody's been able to bring it to this point. So I thank you for

that. Well, thank you very much. And you know, it's very interesting, because this is the first for the White House. You can't say that very often. It's seen a lot over the years, over the since 1800 1799, to be almost exact. But this is a first where we've had so many prime ministers, presidents, the heads of European nations. And by the way, Alex, I'd like you to say a couple of words too. You're a young, powerful man. Before I finish up, I want you to say a couple of words. Go ahead.

Alex Stubb

I'll take the notion of youth back to my wife and try to convince her. Thank you very much, Mr. President, I think in the past two weeks we've probably had more progress in ending this war than we have in the past three and a half years. And I think the fact that we're around this table today is very much symbolic in the sense that it's team Europe and team United States helping Ukraine. And the progress that we are looking out of this meeting is about the security guarantees, which are a big part of this. And then, of course, moving towards a process with a trilateral meeting with you and President Putin and President Zelensky. Some of the international media might wonder, you know, why is the President of Finland here? I think the reason is probably that we might come from a small country, but we have a long border with Russia, over 800 miles. And we, of course, have our own historical experience with Russia from World War Two, the Winter War and the war of continuation. And if I look at the silver lining of where we stand right now we found a solution in 1944 and I'm sure that we'll be able to find a solution in 2025 to end Russia's war of aggression and find and get a lasting and just peace. The situation is very difficult, but that's why we're here.

Trump

Thank you, Alex, very much. Good job. So we're going to be meeting for a while, and we're going to discuss some of the issues. And I don't think there's any issue that's overly complex. It's at a point now where people want to do things I do. I really do believe I've known him for a long time. I've always had a great relationship with him. I think President Putin wants to find an answer to and we'll see. And in a certain period of time, not very far from now, a week or two weeks, we're going to know whether or not we're going to solve this or is this horrible fighting going to continue. We'll do the best to get it ended. And I believe you have two willing parties, and usually that's good news, but two willing parties that want to make a deal, and we'll journey together, and we'll go over and we'll see if it can be done. And it's possible it might not be able to be done. On the other hand, it's possible it will, or will save 1000s and 1000s of lives a week. And so it's something we really have to do, and or at least we have to give it our best. So you can, you can give it your best, but I think we may have a very good outcome. So I want to thank you all and the media. I want to thank you. We're going to be staying here for a little while there. We're going to walk over to the Oval Office, and we're going to have another little discussion about similar matters, and then they're going to go home to their great countries and report, and I'm going to remain here and work, and you're going to go and work, we're all going to be working one we may be in a different location, but that's what we know how to do his work. But I want to thank the media has been actually very fair, generally speaking, very fair. I think it's important that they're fair, because this is a very important is a very important subject. We have to get it ended, and so that's all we ask for is fairness with the media. Thank you all very much. Appreciate it. Thank you very much.

2. **Several GOP governors announced they will deploy additional National Guard troops to DC this week, signalling support and solidarity for President Donald Trump's continued deployment of National Guard and federal law enforcement in the District.** The Governors of Ohio, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, and West Virginia all announced they will be deploying additional troops from each of their state's Guard to reinforce the 800 DC Guard troops already deployed, likely bringing the number of Guard troops in the city up to around 1,100 once the deployments have completed.

3. The President authorised the operation by announcing a "crime emergency" in the District and has repeatedly stated that prior to the deployments violent crime was out of control in the city. The Administration has also indicated they may authorise the Guard to begin carrying weapons as part of the deployment in coming days, with the Guard so far having conducted their patrols unarmed. **During a radio interview on Thursday the President indicated that he may join the Guard during a patrol of the city this evening, although neither he nor the White House have provided further details.** In statements on Monday the President stated that since deployments crime has fallen dramatically in the city, and that as a result restaurant bookings have spiked. Data from the popular restaurant booking site OpenTable has in fact found a drop in restaurant reservations compared to this time last year.

4. **DC Mayor Muriel Bowser has pushed back on the President's characterisation**

of the District as overrun with crime, citing both local and federal data that has shown a drop in violent crime since 2023, with some statistics placing crime in the District at a 30-year low. Bowser has accused the President and the Administration of being dishonest about their reasons for the deployments, stating they are more about immigration enforcement than preventing crime. Since the start of last week, federal agents have arrested 160 undocumented people in the District as part of their ongoing operations.

7. Following the return of enough Democratic members to register a quorum (see previous notes and attached diptel for more detail on this) the Texas State Legislature today passed the proposed new Congressional map for the state, to be implemented ahead of the 2026 mid-term elections. The new map would redraw Texas' congressional districts in such a way as to all but certainly ensure an additional 5 House seats for the GOP in the next election. More detail on the decision and its implications can be found in the attached diptel from BCG Houston.

8. In response to the redrawing of the Texas map, California Governor Gavin Newsome (D) has vowed to secure a ballot measure that would allow him to re-draw California's own Congressional map in such a way as to negate the seats gained by the GOP in Texas. The California Assembly initiated this process today when the chamber voted in favour of placing the ballot measure before Californians. Senior White House officials believe some European leaders are publicly supporting President Trump's effort to end the war in Ukraine, while quietly trying to undo behind-the-scenes progress since the Alaska summit, Axios has learned.

- The White House has asked the Treasury Department to compile a list of sanctions that could plausibly be imposed by Europe against Russia.

Why it matters: Two weeks after the summit between President Trump and Russian President Vladimir Putin, there has been little clear progress toward ending the war. Frustrated Trump aides contend the blame should fall on European allies, not on Trump or even Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Behind the scenes: White House officials are losing patience with European leaders, whom they claim are pushing Ukraine to hold out for unrealistic territorial concessions by Russia.

- Axios has learned that the sanctions the U.S. is urging Europe to adopt against Russia include a complete cessation of all oil and gas purchases — plus secondary tariffs from the EU on India and China, similar to those already imposed on India by the U.S.
- "The Europeans don't get to prolong this war and backdoor unreasonable expectations, while also expecting America to bear the cost," a top White House official told Axios. "If Europe wants to escalate this war, that will be up to them. But they will be hopelessly snatching defeat from the jaws of victory."

What they're thinking: The Europeans are said to be pushing Zelensky to hold out for a "better deal" — a maximalist approach that has exacerbated the war, Trump's inner circle argues.

- The U.S. officials believe British and French officials are being more constructive. But they complain that other major European countries want the U.S. to bear the full cost of the war, while putting no skin in the game themselves.
- "Getting to a deal is an art of the possible," the top official said. "But some of the Europeans continue to operate in a fairy-tale land that ignores the fact it takes two to tango."

The big picture: After his summits with Putin and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky, Trump repeatedly said the next step must be a Putin-Zelensky summit. So far, the Russians have refused.

- At the same time, the Ukrainians have rejected any discussion on possible territorial concessions unless the Russians come to the table.
- Trump was visibly frustrated about the situation during Tuesday's Cabinet meeting. "Everybody is posturing. It's all bullshit," he said.
- Russia's massive air strikes on Kyiv, plus Ukrainian attacks on Russian oil refineries, further signaled that peace wasn't getting any closer.

What they're saying: "Perhaps both sides of this war are not ready to end it themselves. The president wants it to end, but the leaders of these two countries need it to end and must want it to end as well," White House press secretary Karoline Leavitt said on Thursday.

- A senior White House official told Axios that Trump is seriously considering stepping back from the diplomatic efforts until one or both parties begin to show more flexibility.
- "We are going to sit back and watch. Let them fight it out for a while and see what happens," the official said.
- Some U.S. officials have begun to see European leaders as a major obstacle, despite the fact that Trump held a friendly meeting with them and Zelensky less than two weeks ago.

The other side: A senior European official involved in the talks with the U.S. over the Ukraine-Russia war expressed surprise about the U.S. criticism.

- The official was puzzled by the suggestion that European leaders were playing one game with Trump and another behind his back, saying no such gaps existed in reality.
- The official also said European countries are already working on a new set of sanctions against Russia.

The latest: On Friday, Trump's envoy Steve Witkoff and Zelensky's chief of staff Andriy Yermak met in New York.

- They discussed the potential Zelensky-Putin meeting and Yermak invited Witkoff for a first visit to Kyiv, but no significant progress was made, a source with knowledge of the meeting said

I remain concerned that the policy process on *** is disjointed and, as a result, half-formed advice is going to the Foreign Secretary and Prime Minister.

This Embassy was not consulted properly - indeed barely informed - about ***

which was a significant policy shift that should have been properly considered at the centre of government and relevant posts should have been involved. Since then, I am aware of two further pieces of advice that have gone to the Foreign Secretary, and ultimately to NSS/No10. The first, which went up yesterday, recommends that the decision on recognition be made prior to the State Visit and further recommends that the PM tell the President of his decision during the State Visit. If consulted, I would have disagreed strongly with this recommendation which in my view would ***

I have not seen the *** advice in question and nor have officials at the Embassy.

The fact that this Embassy has not been consulted on these pieces of advice, both of which directly relate to the US, illustrates my point: advice is not being properly formulated on this subject.

I would be grateful if we can discuss how we might address this situation.

Introduction

Nearly fifty years ago, as a young Oxford undergraduate, I made the short journey here to a Ditchley conference on the position of young people in post-industrial society.

I was the token Labour youth alongside a similarly recruited Conservative student. We entered the library before dinner, described what it was like to be young, were fed well and then driven back to Oxford.

You see, Ditchley has always made sure it is about the lives of real people!

That early encounter with Ditchley began a lifelong association with this magnificent crucible of ideas. It remains absolutely true that no one leaves this extraordinary place without thinking new thoughts and drawing fresh inspiration.

Although, on the occasion of another Ditchley conference in 2003, I nearly left without my kidneys when thrown from a horse, riding out before breakfast with the then director's wife.

Since the Ditchley Foundation's inaugural lecture in 1962 on 'The Anatomy of Anglo-American Relations', this house has earned its reputation as the spiritual home for examining that most mercurial of creatures: the UK-US relationship. As that first lecture wisely counselled:

"We must never take good Anglo-American relations for granted; they need constant effort, care and refreshment."

And of course, we are particularly mindful of this as we anticipate President Trump's historic second State Visit to Britain later this month.

I like to imagine Churchill road-tested the term 'special relationship' here at Ditchley with America's wartime envoy Harry Hopkins, when the moon was high, and Chequers was too dangerous for the Prime Minister's weekend stays.

In fact, the special relationship began to be forged after the *War of Independence* when France's aid might have gained the mantle for itself. But once Britain had recognised America's independence, our two nations gradually discovered we had more in common than in dispute – the temporary setback of the *War of 1812* notwithstanding.

At the Treaty of Paris celebrations in 1783 a French guest predicted that the thirteen American states would form the world's greatest empire. "Yes", British envoy Caleb Whiteford replied, "*and they will all speak English, every one of them*".

And so was born, stutteringly and incrementally, the Anglosphere and the Anglo-American special relationship at its core.

Today, it is my immense privilege to return here as British Ambassador to the United States.

I offer my thoughts on the future of the special relationship, particularly as I steel myself, once again, to perform my familiar role as professional villain – serving as His Majesty's representative during America's upcoming 250th independence birthday celebrations.

The world today: a new era of great power rivalry

From my vantage point in Washington, distance brings tremendous clarity about where Britain stands today on the world stage, as we face a new era of great power rivalry.

We may not be a contemporary great power, but we are a leading nation, elevated by our UN security council, NATO and G7 status, and more than capable of being talented and nimble enough to thrive in a changing world.

So let me first address the geopolitics that, in my view, make the special relationship more, not less, relevant to the UK's national interest.

We are witnessing an upheaval of the post-Cold War order which has shaken all the comfortable assumptions of a US-led unipolar system.

We now live in an age where the international system is fraying and the UN no longer decisive. We must come to terms with the existence of two global superpowers – America and China – locked in a strategic rivalry.

It is this competition which will shape the next century and in which we cannot avoid being part. Drawn to the US by values and security as well as economics and dealing with a Chinese market we cannot ignore.

I don't wish to reopen old Brexit wounds, but we must honestly assess how the game has changed for us over the past decade. As well as creating a net loss for our economy, leaving the European Union has also altered our geopolitical options.

In the EU, while our relationship was primarily an economic one, we got membership of a "foreign policy multiplier", less independence and autonomy within a bloc and able, through it, to exercise global influence. We were part of the European pack, driving Europe's common and foreign security policy, while hedging our bets through our special relationship with America – and taking constant care to preserve that relationship at all costs.

Leaving the EU was expected by many to give Britain more independence, more autonomy to pursue UK national interests. The truth is: it *has* and it *hasn't*. We find ourselves squeezed between the economic and regulatory powers of the US, EU and China, at a time when these blocs have begun to assert their economic interests via tariffs, protectionism and greater emphasis on secure supply chains and economic security.

But there is a paradox here: some suggested that Britain's departure from the European Union would weaken our value as an American partner. In reality, Brexit has freed us to pursue closer US ties.

Britain has the opportunity to use its regulatory freedom and independence from European law to deepen American investment opportunities. This is crucial as, post-Brexit, we need to leverage every advantage we can to spur UK growth and employment.

At the same time, it is fair to say that Britain has retained a seat at the European top table at key international moments, as we saw in Washington this summer. So, the early claims that, out of the EU, Britain will have less weight and relevance in Washington have turned out to be false.

Looking beyond our European neighbours, the reality is that the global trading system that once served us well has come back to haunt us. For decades, the West has enabled China's

massively state-subsidised economy to flood the global market with products, undermine our manufacturing and hollow out industries.

We have bred over-supply and dependence on Chinese supply chains. Most critically, working people in both our countries have been left behind. Waves of deindustrialisation, widening wealth inequalities, economic dispossession – these shocks have created profound challenges to culture, place and society to which we have paid insufficient attention until now.

So yes, I credit President Trump's political instincts in identifying the anxieties gripping not only millions of Americans, but also far more pervasive Western trends: economic stagnation for many, a sense of irreversible decline, the lost promise of meaningful work.

In short, the overwhelming feeling that 'the system' no longer delivers as it used to. The comforting presumption that your children will be better off than you has evaporated within a generation. These American concerns find their mirror image in British society, where Keir Starmer won an electoral mandate for national renewal which is similar to Donald Trump's.

These are the conditions in which *modern mercantilism* is now taking root, where impatient and fed-up electorates demand their nations prioritise their own national economic interest and self-sufficiency. Globalisation is not dead, but it is being dramatically reconfigured. For an outward-facing trading economy like Britain, earning our living in the world has become significantly harder.

Simultaneously, whilst the economics have got harder, today's security threats are more dangerous and unpredictable than anything we have faced since the Cold War. Our adversaries act ever more in unison, as new technologies transform how economic advantage is pursued and war is fought.

Putin wages war in Ukraine using Chinese technology and armed with Iranian and North Korean weapons. And let me be absolutely clear: what keeps me awake at night is China winning the race for technological dominance in the coming decades – and how that will affect every facet of our lives.

Some may have forgotten just how central scientific competition was in the early stages of the Cold War, but we are now living in a technological revolution unlike any before.

China does not want to be like the West, but it has learned the lessons of the West's advantages gained through scientific investment and invention. As a result, it combines economic dynamism, scientific innovation, the ability to plan for longer than an electoral cycle, with strategic patience in ways that make them the most formidable modern competitor the West has encountered.

China is racing to dominate artificial intelligence, quantum computing and biotechnology. They've embarked on a dramatic expansion of their army, navy and air force and are moving into space. They are lifting secrets through espionage and cyber-attacks while dramatically multiplying their own rate of innovation.

The core US-China technology rivalry is not merely a contest for economic primacy – it's a struggle over values, over what kind of world the next generation will inherit: one that fosters freedom and debate in the decades ahead, or one that imposes centralised command and control.

Only America has the capability, wealth and determination to compete with China technologically. As a science-rich nation ourselves, how we meet this challenge and choose our partners in doing so will shape our economic prosperity and national security for the foreseeable future.

Doing so in tandem with the US is where Britain's future lies. We must be ready to forge a US-UK technology partnership as significant as the Mutual Defence Agreement and subsequent nuclear treaty that Harold Macmillan negotiated with President Kennedy. To this day, these remain the foundation stone of our defence and intelligence relationship nearly seven decades later.

The technology partnership should reflect the unique levels of trust and complementary skills we already share. It is a division of responsibility that, while not equal, works to both nations' advantage.

This brings me to my central premise about the future: while we are independent of America, it is not in our interests to be separate from America.

I draw a clear line between the sentimental and the instrumental approaches to our national interest. Our alliance with America endures not because of shared history or because we get on with the President of the day, but because it consistently delivers mutual advantage.

Do we always have identical views? Of course not, we never have. And we are not looking for special treatment. Our alliance exists because it serves both nations' interests, because the core values of Britons and Americans remain aligned, as the world around us becomes more threatening.

For Britain, the relationship means we have more ability to shape events by co-ordinating our policies with those of America in every region of the world.

We can disagree, but we cannot be fair-weather friends. Not when we want to be close partners in good times and an influential voice in difficult times. This has always relied on strategic depth, not just personal interaction.

So, the choice before us is stark and urgent. The technology revolution will change everything, and US-China competition will define this century. The Atlantic alliance must evolve to meet the greatest challenge of our age: keeping ahead in the global technology race that will determine our fate in the 21st century.

Understanding the Age of Trump

I know that some listening today may doubt our ability to work more closely with the US internationally with President Trump's White House.

They will point to his trade policies that are affecting friends and foe alike, his rejection of the prevailing climate consensus and his dismantlement of decades-old US development programmes. That his *America First* credo is not compatible with deeper co-operation with others, including Britain. That Britain must pivot away from America.

My time working alongside the Trump administration has taught me this is lazy thinking. The President may not follow the usual rulebook or conventional practice, but he is a risk taker in a world where a 'business as usual' approach no longer works.

Indeed, he seems to have an iron-clad stomach for political risk, both at home and abroad. Convening other nations and intervening in conflicts that other presidents would have thought endlessly about before descending into an analysis paralysis and impotent incrementalism.

Yet – and this is not well understood – although the Trumpian national security strategy is called '*America First*', it does not mean '*America Alone*'.

We see him leverage America's heft to put the right people in the room and hammer out compromises, to grind out concessions.

I am not just thinking of Ukraine where the President has brought fresh energy to efforts to end this intractable war. If the President were so indifferent to the rest of the world we would not have seen him engage with both India and Pakistan in their conflict. Likewise, the war between DRC and Rwanda. He would have let Armenia and Azerbaijan carry on fighting. He would not be spending political capital on an overall deal in Gaza that stops the war, frees the hostages, gets aid in and enables reconstruction in the context of a wider settlement for the Palestinian people.

Furthermore, the international order people claim he has disrupted and the calm he has allegedly shattered was already at breaking point. So, I would argue that Trump is more consequence than cause of the upheaval we are experiencing. He is using the might of the United States globally to do things that other democracies are unable or unwilling to do.

It is not my job to offer a rationale for America's president – I am not his explainer-in-chief – and we might all have a quieter life in Washington if he was, how should I say, less 'dynamic' in changing the discourse of politics.

But it is clear to me, that what we are seeing play out is a change of epoch in the new politics that is emerging in different forms across the Western world.

He will not always get everything right but with his Sharpie pen and freewheeling Oval Office press sprays he has sounded a deafening wake up call to the sleep-walking international old guard.

And the President is right about the status quo failing from America's point of view. The world has rested on the willingness of the US to act as sheriff, to form a posse whenever anything went wrong, a world in which America's allies could fall in behind – not always *that* close behind – and then allow the US to do most of the heavy lifting.

The American people gave a mandate to President Trump to change this and to say to allies: step up and take more of the brunt, especially in their own backyard. And this is the message he is taking to Allies.

He also understands that the US needs Europe, strong and close enough, to counter Chinese power, including its hegemony in Asia.

America is enmeshed in every layer of the world and has to play every ball lobbed at it. But with echoes of Reagan, Trump's own doctrine of 'peace through strength' recognises the need to be battle-ready while avoiding forever wars.

Trump understands the positive coercive power of traditional American deterrence; deterring adversaries through a blend of firepower and strategic unpredictability, as we saw in his decisive action on Iran's nuclear programme. Well beyond their military impact, these strikes gave a swathe of malign foreign regimes pause for thought.

Britain's contract with America

Let me now turn to our own alliance with America. As British Ambassador, I have seen first-hand the sheer magnitude of what lies beneath the bonnet of the UK-US relationship. Across so many fields of British life, be this the film industry, aerospace, AI, media, signals intelligence, submarine production, pharmaceuticals, farming, higher education, the City of London – like it or not – our US partnership has become indispensable to the functioning of our nation.

Beyond President Trump's instinctive warmth towards Britain, we cannot simply take it for granted that the breadth of this and of future US administrations will see the value of the 'special relationship' in the way we do. There can be no complacency. It is vital that we demonstrate to the next tier of US political leadership – and to the next Republican and Democrat generations – exactly how UK partnerships in economics, technology, and security deliver tangible value for Americans and Brits alike.

So, what do we need to do to ensure the special relationship between our countries endures?

First and foremost, for our national security if we want to continue to benefit from America's massive defence and intelligence spend – and believe me, we certainly benefit in countless visible and less visible ways – we need to remain relevant to the US in defence.

It is critical to bolster the UK's will and ability to act alongside America in different parts of the world, not just Europe. America's 'day one, night one ally', as the Prime Minister has said.

We're taking the big decisions – like restoring nuclear strike capabilities to the Royal Air Force, purchasing new F-35A fighters equipped with American nuclear weapons for NATO's deterrence mission.

This represents a new chapter of British-American strategic integration, which complements our continuous at-sea nuclear deterrence and deepens our role as vital security partners – as we have been in every major international conflict since the Second World War, bar Vietnam.

But what sets Britain apart from many of its European neighbours is our *willingness* to engage and fight where necessary. German re-armament, for example, is hugely welcome and important but, in American eyes, will it be accompanied by a willingness to fight alongside America when the chips are down and we face a common threat?

On the ground in Ukraine, because Britain went early and hard, and because we are a trusted partner of the US, we have provided vital operational linkages for armament and intelligence and target sharing with Ukrainian armed forces.

In continuing to do so, Britain has to be conscious of the pockets of risk aversion in parts of the Whitehall machine and creeping legalism – a desire to find any legal pretext to avoid having to act.

Sometimes at moments of acute international danger we must recognise that necessary and urgent action cannot be beholden to a Russian or Chinese veto at the UN Security Council. The UN is a key institution in which we remain heavily invested. But too often UN processes are reduced solely to important signalling.

If we do not want *America First* to mean *America Alone*, we must be prepared for our forces to saddle up and ride out together when it's right to do so – and work to bring our European and Five Eyes allies with us.

As part of its own recalibration, the US administration is asking what greater commitment its allies should take on in the European theatre. This review is long overdue. But the US must avoid the trap of strict geographical division of labour.

Any strategy to compete with China, as well as counter Russia, will need to be collective, based on shared risks and costs. To this end, the US must incentivise as well as pressure natural allies into action. We are greater together.

For Britain, this is about our role in the world and a recognition that while we are chiefly focussed on Europe and are NATO-first, our interests do not stop at the borders of Europe. We must also have relevance and utility to the US in the Indo-Pacific where we have increasingly important strategic partners in Australia, Japan and South Korea.

In this respect, we need to protect and amplify AUKUS as a critical pillar of US national security strategy. The UK and Australia need to demonstrate to the US that they are both investing enough in AUKUS and that it is really adding net capability, not diverting US resources.

It is about ensuring we have interoperable submarines for all three countries for use around the world, able to fight together in the Indo-Pacific, Euro-Atlantic or anywhere else they are needed.

AUKUS already removes barriers to technology sharing between like-minded allies. Collectively we want to build on this and ensure that we maintain the technological edge – well beyond submarines to the future-facing weapons that will protect our people and interests in this century, as it did in the last.

Because this is about how we respond to the China challenge and its single-minded pursuit of *regional* military, and *global* technological, dominance.

A vibrant modern economy

In the end, a nation's position in the world is only as strong as the economy that sustains it.

I am confident that the strong fundamentals of the UK economy, notably its world class universities and science base, will enable Britain to turn itself into a modern, AI-boosted economy.

We may not be a science superpower, but our science base is already per capita bigger than America's and China's. It should be a source of national pride that we are the only other nation to boast a trillion-dollar tech sector.

To grow and apply our science ambitions we need greater access to the know-how, talent flows and investment capital that America provides. The numbers already tell the story of a truly golden economic corridor across the Atlantic: over £1.2 trillion in mutual investment, £322 billion in bilateral trade, and 2.5 million jobs sustained across both our economies. And this is balanced. Too few Americans are aware that the UK is the single largest foreign investor in 21 US states – including giants such as Texas, New York and California.

We have got off to an enviable start as the first country to negotiate a trade deal with President Trump. Do not underestimate the significance of this. It is not just a political prize. The deal reflected long-held ambition for a trade deal on both sides and has materialised into an arrangement covering the bulk of our high value industrial and goods exports to the United States.

Now is the time for the next big step. AI, and quantum, will become the main drivers of economic growth and the transformation of our public services which we need to lift us out of the economic stagnation we have experienced over the last decade and more.

To do this, the UK must dramatically raise levels of investment, above all from the country closest to us, America. We must leave no stone unturned in Britain to create a globally competitive 'total business environment'. This, by the way, must include a reliable and affordable expanding energy supply. This is very much the message I am receiving from potential American investors.

Where we go next: the UK-US Technology Partnership

It is why I have made it my foremost priority as British Ambassador to create a full spectrum US-UK technology partnership. Hard-wired in national security but sparking new life-enhancing breakthroughs across the entire scientific landscape.

We must combine the formidable assets at our joint disposal: our two huge technology sectors, extraordinary pools of talent encompassing all the world's top 15 universities and cutting-edge research facilities. I want US tech companies to look at the UK as their second home.

Layered over this are our shared values, shared language and high comfort levels and history of working together to out-innovate our rivals. From the dawn of the nuclear age through *the Manhattan project* and the creation of radar, the internet, and today's quantum breakthroughs, our nations have repeatedly proven that UK-US collaboration produces world-changing results.

The opportunities now are vast: artificial intelligence, biotechnology, quantum computing, nuclear fusion, space exploration. The list goes on.

Some of this innovation will be undertaken by American companies and some by British ones. But where we want them to combine, we should not see this in zero sum terms. When Google bought *Deepmind* it did not disappear – its growth accelerated, and it is now a top tier UK-based company.

We cannot afford to be passive observers of the AI revolution. We must be its architects. This means backing the innovators to unleash their potential for human progress and allied advantage. These transformative technologies must not be stifled with excessive regulation as we have seen in the EU's GDPR, AI and other laws which they are now trying to reform.

So, where do we go next?

First, we must create resilient supply chains for the most critical technologies and materials, reducing dependence on strategic rivals.

Second, we must solve the energy equation. This is urgent. The AI revolution will need abundant, secure and competitively priced energy across the board. This is why both the US and UK are embarking on a new era of nuclear power deployment in both countries.

Third, we must build the infrastructure that powers tomorrow's digital economy – streamlining regulations that slow down progress and investment.

And finally, we must invest in the next generation through joint talent programmes, shared facilities and seamless career pathways spanning both countries.

The question facing us is simple: will the technologies that reshape human civilisation be developed in Beijing or in Boston, in Shenzhen or King's Cross?

The Atlantic alliance has prevailed in every great contest of the modern era. Today's technological competition will be no different, but we must act with the urgency and unity this moment demands.

Conclusion

Let me conclude this lecture with where we began: the enduring power of the Atlantic alliance.

The approaching 250th anniversary of American independence marks one of history's most remarkable transformations: from bitter adversaries to steadfast allies that have shaped the modern world together.

From Wall Street to Silicon Valley and everywhere in between, I have witnessed how Britain and America remain bound by a deep kinship and cultural affinity that transcends borders and generations.

Our special relationship lives and thrives on familiarity, trust, and a constant exchange of creativity and ideas which enriches both societies.

Once again, our two nations stand at a pivotal moment. The technological revolution demands that we find the confidence and courage to leverage Britain's strengths to reap the reciprocal benefits of our closest ally, at the forefront of the race that will determine how our citizens live, work and pursue happiness.

If we are to prosper, the technologies of tomorrow must be developed in a freedom-respecting Western blueprint not an autocratic Chinese one.

A final thought: we do not have to alter our own outlook to maximise the full benefits of our special relationship. We can be respectful without being sycophantic.

President Trump's State Visit will showcase the best of British traditions and ceremony, but at its core will be new agreements that write the next chapter of transatlantic success; to create jobs, drive innovation and ensure that British and American ingenuity continues to lead the world.

In the end, the special relationship is not about sentiment or nostalgia, it is about mutual benefit which needs to resonate with American interests and American voters as much as our own.

Under this administration we have made a promising start. Now we must build on it. ENDS

Britain and America in the Age of Trump – and Beyond

6 September 2025

Introduction

Nearly fifty years ago, as a young Oxford undergraduate, I made the short journey here to a Ditchley conference on the position of young people in post-industrial society.

I was the token Labour youth alongside a similarly recruited Conservative student. We entered the library before dinner, described what it was like to be young, were fed well and then driven back to Oxford.

You see, Ditchley has always made sure it is about the lives of real people!

That early encounter with Ditchley began a lifelong association with this magnificent crucible of ideas. It remains absolutely true that no one leaves this extraordinary place without thinking new thoughts and drawing fresh inspiration.

Although, on the occasion of another Ditchley conference in 2003, I nearly left without my kidneys when thrown from a horse, riding out before breakfast with the then director's wife.

Since the Ditchley Foundation's inaugural lecture in 1962 on 'The Anatomy of Anglo-American Relations', this house has earned its reputation as the spiritual home for examining that most mercurial of creatures: the UK-US relationship. As that first lecture wisely counselled:

"We must never take good Anglo-American relations for granted; they need constant effort, care and refreshment."

And of course, we are particularly mindful of this as we anticipate President Trump's historic second State Visit to Britain later this month.

I like to imagine Churchill road-tested the term 'special relationship' here at Ditchley with America's wartime envoy Harry Hopkins, when the moon was high, and Chequers was too dangerous for the Prime Minister's weekend stays.

In fact, the special relationship began to be forged after the *War of Independence* when France's aid might have gained the mantle for itself. But once Britain had recognised America's independence, our two nations gradually discovered we had more in common than in dispute – the temporary setback of the *War of 1812* notwithstanding.

At the Treaty of Paris celebrations in 1783 a French guest predicted that the thirteen American states would form the world's greatest empire. "Yes", British envoy Caleb Whitefoord replied, "*and they will all speak English, every one of them*".

And so was born, stutteringly and incrementally, the Anglosphere and the Anglo-American special relationship at its core.

Today, it is my immense privilege to return here as British Ambassador to the United States.

I offer my thoughts on the future of the special relationship, particularly as I steel myself, once again, to perform my familiar role as professional villain – serving as His Majesty's representative during America's upcoming 250th independence birthday celebrations.

The world today: a new era of great power rivalry

From my vantage point in Washington, distance brings tremendous clarity about where Britain stands today on the world stage, as we face a new era of great power rivalry.

We remain a leading nation, elevated by our UN security council, NATO and G7 status, and more than capable of being talented and nimble enough to thrive in a changing world.

So let me first address the geopolitics that, in my view, make the special relationship more, not less, relevant to the UK's national interest.

We are witnessing an upheaval of the post-Cold War order which has shaken all the comfortable assumptions of a US-led unipolar system.

We now live in an age where the international system is fragmenting with the UN frequently deadlocked as a result. We must come to terms with the existence of two global superpowers – America and China – locked in a strategic rivalry.

It is this competition which will shape this century and in which we cannot avoid being part. Drawn to the US by values and security as well as economics – and dealing with a Chinese market we cannot ignore and from whose growth we can also benefit.

I don't wish to reopen old Brexit wounds, but we must honestly assess how the game has changed for us over the past decade. As well as creating a net loss for our economy, leaving the European Union has also altered our geopolitical options.

In the EU, while our relationship was primarily an economic one, we got membership of a "foreign policy multiplier", less independence and autonomy within a bloc and able, through it, to exercise global influence. We were part of the European pack, driving Europe's common and foreign security policy, while hedging our bets through our special relationship with America – and taking constant care to preserve that relationship at all costs.

Leaving the EU was expected by many to give Britain more independence, more autonomy to pursue UK national interests. The truth is: it *has* and it *hasn't*. We find ourselves squeezed between the economic and regulatory powers of the US, EU and China, at a time when these blocs have begun to assert their economic interests via tariffs, protectionism and greater emphasis on secure supply chains and economic security.

But there is a paradox here: some suggested that Britain's departure from the European Union would weaken our value as an American partner. In reality, Brexit has freed us to pursue closer US ties.

Britain has the opportunity to use its regulatory freedom and independence from European law to deepen American investment opportunities, carefully choosing those areas where that may be to our net benefit. This is crucial as, post-Brexit, we need to leverage every advantage we can to spur UK growth and employment.

At the same time, it is fair to say that under this government, Britain has reformed European links, put the ill will of the past behind us and regained a seat at the European top table at key international moments, as we saw in Washington this summer. So, the early claims that, out of the EU, Britain will have less relevance or less weight in Washington have turned out to be false.

Looking beyond our European neighbours, the reality is that the open global trading system that once served us well has come back to haunt us. For decades, the West has enabled China's massively state-subsidised economy to flood the global market with products and hollow out our manufacturing industries.

Yes, we have gained from lower costs, but we have bred over-supply and dependence on Chinese supply chains. Most critically, working people in both our countries have been left behind. Waves of deindustrialisation, widening wealth inequalities, economic dispossession – these shocks have created profound challenges to culture, place and society to which we have paid insufficient attention until now.

So yes, I credit President Trump's political instincts in identifying the anxieties gripping not only millions of Americans, but also far more pervasive Western trends: economic stagnation for many, a sense of irreversible decline, the lost promise of meaningful work.

In short, the overwhelming feeling that 'the system' no longer delivers as it used to. The comforting presumption that your children will be better off than you has evaporated within a generation. These American concerns find their mirror image in British society, where Keir Starmer won an electoral mandate for national renewal which is similar to Donald Trump's.

These are the conditions in which *modern mercantilism* is now taking root, where impatient and fed-up electorates demand their nations prioritise their own national economic interest and self-sufficiency. Globalisation is not dead, but it is being dramatically reconfigured. For an outward-facing trading economy like Britain, earning our living in the world has become significantly harder.

Simultaneously, whilst the economics have got harder, today's security threats are more dangerous and unpredictable than anything we have faced since the Cold War. Putin wages war in Ukraine using Chinese technology and armed with Iranian and North Korean weapons. Our adversaries act ever more in unison, as new technologies transform how economic advantage is pursued and war is fought.

Some may have forgotten just how central scientific competition was in the early stages of the Cold War, but we are now living in a technological revolution unlike any before.

And let me be absolutely clear: if China wins the race for technological dominance in the coming decades, every facet of our lives will be affected

China does not want to be like the West, but it has learned the lessons of the West's advantages gained through scientific investment and invention. As a result, it combines economic dynamism, scientific innovation, the ability to plan for longer than an electoral cycle, with strategic patience in ways that make them the most formidable modern competitor the West has encountered.

China is racing to dominate artificial intelligence, quantum computing and biotechnology. They've embarked on a dramatic expansion of their army, navy and air force and are moving into space. They are both copying us and dramatically multiplying their own rate of innovation.

The core US-China technology rivalry is not merely a contest for economic primacy – it's a struggle over values, over what kind of world the next generation will inherit: one that fosters freedom and debate in the decades ahead, or one that imposes centralised command and control.

Only America has the capability, wealth and determination to compete with China technologically. As a science-rich nation ourselves, how we also meet this challenge, and choose our partners in doing so, will shape our economic prosperity and national security for the foreseeable future.

This is why we must pursue US-UK technology partnerships as significant as the Mutual Defence Agreement and subsequent nuclear treaty that Harold Macmillan negotiated with President Kennedy. To this day, these remain the foundation stone of our defence and intelligence relationship nearly seven decades later.

These technology partnerships should reflect the unique levels of trust and complementary skills we already share. It is a division of responsibility that, while not equal, works to both nations' advantage.

This brings me to my central premise about the future: while we are independent of America, it is not in our interests to be separate from America.

I draw a clear line between the sentimental and the instrumental approaches to our national interest. Our alliance with America endures not because of shared history or because we get on with the President of the day, but because it consistently delivers mutual advantage.

Do we always have identical views? Of course not, we never have. And we are not looking for special treatment. Our alliance exists because it serves both nations' interests, because the core values of Britons and Americans remain aligned, as the world around us becomes more threatening.

For Britain, the relationship means we have more ability to shape events by co-ordinating our policies with those of America in every region of the world.

We can disagree, but we cannot be fair-weather friends. Not when we want to be close partners in good times and an influential voice in difficult times. This has always relied on strategic depth, not just personal interaction.

So, the choice before us is stark and urgent. The technology revolution will change everything, and US-China competition will define this century. The Atlantic alliance must evolve to meet the greatest challenge of our age: keeping ahead in the global technology race that will determine our fate in the 21st century.

Understanding the Age of Trump

I know that some listening today may doubt our ability to work more closely with President Trump's White House in Washington and around the world.

They will point to his trade policies that affect friends and foe alike, his rejection of the prevailing climate consensus and his dismantlement of decades-old US development programmes. That his *America First* credo is not compatible with deeper co-operation with others, including Britain. That Britain must pivot away from America.

My time working alongside the Trump administration has taught me this is lazy thinking. The President may not follow the traditional rulebook or conventional practice, but he is a risk taker in a world where a 'business as usual' approach no longer works.

Indeed, he seems to have an iron-clad stomach for political risk, both at home and abroad. Convening other nations and intervening in conflicts that other presidents would have

thought endlessly about before descending into an analysis paralysis and gradual incrementalism.

Yet – and this is not well understood – although the Trumpian national security strategy is called '*America First*', it does not mean '*America Alone*'.

We see him leverage America's heft to put the right people in the room and hammer out compromises, to grind out concessions.

I am not just thinking of Ukraine where the President has brought fresh energy to efforts to end Putin's brutal invasion and bring peace to the region. If the President were so indifferent to the rest of the world, he would not have intervened in multiple spheres of conflict over the last seven months.

Furthermore, the 'international order' people claim he has disrupted and the calm he has allegedly shattered was already at breaking point. So, I would argue that Trump is more consequence than cause of the upheaval we are experiencing. He is using the might of the United States globally to do things that other democracies are unable or unwilling to do.

It is not my job to offer a rationale for America's president. I am not his explainer-in-chief. But it is clear to me, that what we are seeing play out is a change of epoch in the new politics that is emerging in different forms across the Western world.

He will not always get everything right but with his Sharpie pen and freewheeling Oval Office press sprays he has sounded a deafening wake up call to the international old guard.

And the President is right about the status quo failing from America's point of view. The world has rested on the willingness of the US to act as sheriff, to form a posse whenever anything went wrong, a world in which America's allies could fall in behind – not always *that* close behind – and then allow the US to do most of the heavy lifting.

The American people gave a mandate to President Trump to change this and to say to allies: step up and take more of the brunt, especially in their own backyard. And this is the message he is taking to Allies.

He also understands that the US needs Europe, strong and close enough, to counterbalance Chinese power and that of its autocratic allies – as we saw in Beijing this week.

Trump understands the positive coercive power of traditional American deterrence; deterring adversaries through a blend of firepower and strategic unpredictability, as we saw in his decisive action on Iran's nuclear programme. Well beyond their military impact, these strikes gave a swathe of malign foreign regimes pause for thought.

Britain's contract with America

Let me now turn to our own alliance with America. As British Ambassador, I have seen first-hand the sheer magnitude of what lies beneath the bonnet of the UK-US relationship. Across so many fields of British life, be this the film industry, aerospace, AI, media, signals intelligence, submarine production, pharmaceuticals, farming, higher education, the City of London – like it or not – our US partnership has become indispensable to the functioning of our nation.

Beyond President Trump's instinctive warmth towards Britain, we cannot simply take it for granted that the breadth of this, and of future US administrations, will see the value of the

'special relationship' in the way we do. There can be no complacency. It is vital that we demonstrate to the next tier of US political leadership – and to the next Republican and Democrat generations – exactly how UK partnerships in economics, technology, and security deliver tangible value for Americans and Brits alike.

So, what do we need to do to ensure the special relationship between our countries endures?

First and foremost, for our national security if we want to continue to benefit from America's massive defence and intelligence spend – and believe me, we certainly benefit in countless visible and less visible ways – we need to remain relevant to the US in defence.

It is critical to sustain the UK's will and ability to act alongside America in different parts of the world, not just Europe. America's 'day one, night one ally', as the Prime Minister has said.

We're taking the big decisions – like restoring nuclear strike capabilities to the Royal Air Force, purchasing new F-35A fighters equipped with American nuclear weapons for NATO's deterrence mission.

This represents a new chapter of British-American strategic integration, which complements our continuous at-sea nuclear deterrence and deepens our role as vital security partners – as we have been in every major international conflict since the Second World War, bar Vietnam.

But what sets Britain apart from many of its European neighbours is our *willingness* to engage and fight where necessary. German re-armament, for example, is hugely welcome and important, assuming their willingness to fight alongside America when the chips are down and we face a common threat.

On the ground in Ukraine, because Britain went early and hard, and because we are a trusted partner of the US, we have provided vital operational linkages for armament and intelligence and target sharing with Ukrainian armed forces.

Sometimes at moments of acute international danger, all too often necessary and urgent action comes up against a Russian or Chinese veto at the UN Security Council. The UN is a key institution in which we remain heavily invested. But reform is needed to avoid UN processes being reduced to toothless signalling.

If we do not want *America First* to mean *America Alone*, we must be prepared for our forces to saddle up and ride out together when it's right to do so – and work to bring our European and Five Eyes allies with us.

As part of its own recalibration, the US administration is asking what greater commitment its allies should take on in the European theatre. This review is long overdue. But the US must avoid the trap of strict geographical division of labour.

Any strategy to compete with China, as well as counter Russia, will need to be collective, based on shared risks and costs. To this end, the US must incentivise as well as pressure natural allies into action. We are greater together.

For Britain, this is about our role in the world and a recognition that while we are chiefly focussed on Europe and are NATO-first, our interests do not stop at the borders of Europe. We must also have relevance and utility to the US in the Indo-Pacific where we have

increasingly important strategic partners in Australia, Japan and South Korea.

In this respect, we need to protect and amplify AUKUS as a critical pillar of US national security strategy. The UK and Australia need to demonstrate to the US that they are both investing enough in AUKUS and that it is really adding net capability, not diverting US resources.

It is about ensuring we have interoperable submarines for all three countries for use around the world, able to fight together in the Indo-Pacific, Euro-Atlantic or anywhere else they are needed.

The Americans, who are building and supplying submarines have a reasonable expectation of how they will be deployed in combat, subject to usual political decision-making.

AUKUS already removes barriers to technology sharing between like-minded allies. Collectively we want to build on this and ensure that we maintain the technological edge – well beyond submarines to the future-facing weapons that will protect our people and interests in this century, as it did in the last.

Because this is about how we respond to the China challenge and its single-minded pursuit of *regional* military, and *global* technological, dominance.

A vibrant modern economy

In the end, a nation's position in the world is only as strong as the economy that sustains it.

I am confident that the strong fundamentals of the UK economy, notably its world-class universities and science base, will enable Britain to turn itself into a modern, AI-boosted economy.

Our science base is already per capita bigger than America's and China's. It should be a source of national pride that we are the only other nation to boast a trillion-dollar tech sector.

To grow and apply our science ambitions we need greater access to the know-how, talent flows and investment capital that America provides. The numbers already tell the story of a truly golden economic corridor across the Atlantic: over £1.2 trillion in mutual investment, £322 billion in bilateral trade, and 2.5 million jobs sustained across both our economies. And this is balanced. Too few Americans are aware that the UK is the largest foreign investor in 21 US states – including giants such as Texas, New York and California.

We have got off to an enviable start as the first country to negotiate a trade deal with President Trump. Do not underestimate the significance of this. It is not just a political prize. The deal reflected a long-held ambition for a trade deal on both sides. It has been forged into an arrangement covering the bulk of our high value industrial and goods exports to the United States.

Now is the time for the next big step. AI, and quantum, will become the main drivers of economic growth and the transformation of our public services which we need to lift us out of the economic stagnation we have experienced over the last decade and more.

To do this, the UK must dramatically raise levels of investment, above all from the country 'closest' to us, America. We must leave no stone unturned in Britain to create a globally competitive 'total business environment'. This, by the way, must include a reliable and

affordable expanding energy supply. This is very much the message I am receiving from potential American investors.

Where we go next: the UK-US Technology Partnership

It is why I have made it my foremost priority as British Ambassador to create a full spectrum US-UK technology partnership. Hard-wired in national security but sparking new life-enhancing breakthroughs across the entire scientific landscape.

We must combine the formidable assets at our joint disposal: our two huge technology sectors, extraordinary pools of talent encompassing all the world's top 15 universities and cutting-edge research facilities. I want US tech companies to look at the UK as their second home.

Layered over this are our shared values, shared language and high comfort levels and history of working together to out-innovate our rivals. From the dawn of the nuclear age through *the Manhattan project* and the creation of radar, the internet, and today's quantum breakthroughs, our nations have repeatedly proven that UK-US collaboration produces world-changing results.

The opportunities now are vast: artificial intelligence, biotechnology, quantum computing, nuclear fusion, space exploration. The list goes on.

Some of this innovation will be undertaken by American companies and some by British ones. But where we want them to combine, we should not see this in zero sum terms. When Google bought *Deepmind* it did not disappear – its growth accelerated, and it is now a top tier UK-based company.

We cannot afford to be passive observers of the AI revolution. We must be its architects. This means backing the innovators to unleash their potential for human progress and allied advantage. These transformative technologies must not be stifled with excessive regulation as we have seen in the EU's GDPR, AI and other laws which they are now trying to reform.

So, where do we go next?

First, we must create resilient supply chains for the most critical technologies and materials, reducing dependence on strategic rivals.

Second, we must solve the energy equation. This is urgent. The AI revolution will need abundant, secure and competitively priced energy across the board. This is why both the US and UK are embarking on a new era of nuclear power deployment in both countries.

Third, we must build the infrastructure that powers tomorrow's digital economy – streamlining regulations that slow down progress and investment.

And finally, we must invest in the next generation through joint talent programmes, shared facilities and seamless career pathways spanning both countries.

The question facing us is simple: will the technologies that reshape human civilisation be developed in Beijing or in Boston, in Shenzhen or King's Cross?

The Atlantic alliance has prevailed in every great contest of the modern era. Today's technological competition will be no different, but we must act with the urgency and unity this moment demands.

Conclusion

Let me conclude this lecture with where we began: the enduring power of the Atlantic alliance.

The approaching 250th anniversary of American independence marks one of history's most remarkable transformations: from bitter adversaries to steadfast allies that have shaped the modern world together.

From Wall Street to Silicon Valley and everywhere in between, I have witnessed how Britain and America remain bound by a deep kinship and cultural affinity that transcends borders and generations.

Our special relationship lives and thrives on familiarity, trust, and a constant exchange of creativity and ideas which enriches both societies.

Once again, our two nations stand at a pivotal moment. The technological revolution demands that we find the confidence and courage to leverage Britain's strengths to reap the reciprocal benefits of our closest ally, at the forefront of the race that will determine how our citizens live, work and pursue happiness.

If we are to prosper, the technologies of tomorrow must be developed in a freedom-respecting Western blueprint not an autocratic Chinese one.

A final thought: we do not have to alter our own outlook to maximise the full benefits of our special relationship. We can be respectful without being sycophantic.

President Trump's State Visit will showcase the best of British traditions and ceremony, but at its core will be new agreements that write the next chapter of transatlantic success; to create jobs, drive innovation and ensure that British and American ingenuity continues to lead the world.

In the end, the special relationship is not about sentiment or nostalgia, it is about mutual benefit which needs to resonate with American interests and American voters as much as our own.

Under this administration we have made a promising start. Now we must build on it.

We spoke this afternoon about continued media interest in your links to Jeffrey Epstein. Later this evening we spoke again about the immediate issue of the interview you were due to give to Harry Cole, which I recommended against. You told me in that second call that Bloomberg had put a series of points and questions to you. I've now had a chance to read through the email exchange your office then forwarded me. Stepping back from the immediate media handling, I think the Bloomberg message generates some questions I need to discuss with you for both your sake and the department's:

- Are the Bloomberg quotations and references likely (as far as you know / can recall) to be broadly accurate, or is something in their message seriously inaccurate or a misrepresentation?
- Did you accept hospitality / flights / other material gifts from Mr Epstein while a Member of Parliament, a European Commissioner, and/or a UK Minister? If so, were these registered / disclosed as required?
- There are suggestions in the Bloomberg message (perhaps linked to the story that now leads the Telegraph website) that you were engaged on projects of some sort with Mr Epstein and Jes Staley while a Minister. Were these projects Government business and were these interactions therefore appropriately disclosed to officials and recorded?
- There are several suggestions in the Bloomberg message that you engaged in some sort of work or advocacy on Mr Epstein's behalf to try to alleviate his legal difficulties. Is that right? If so, were you doing so while in public office as a Commissioner or a Minister? Did you use those positions to raise his case directly or indirectly with US political figures?

Beyond these procedural questions, we discussed in detail in our afternoon call that these sorts of exchanges between you and Mr Epstein would raise broader questions of judgement, and lead colleagues and others to fear that your credence in Mr Epstein's story and supportive messaging reveal a lack of concern for Mr Epstein's victims. We should probably return to these issues tomorrow when we have both had a little rest.

As you will have seen, my position as Ambassador to the United States has come to an end.

The circumstances surrounding the announcement today are ones which I deeply regret and I would not wish to leave under them. But, I accept the Prime Minister's decision and will leave a position I have been so incredibly honoured to serve.

The relationship between Britain and the United States of America is a unique one. I know that you will continue to serve and deepen that relationship from DC to right across our brilliant network.

I wish to thank you for all of your efforts in serving me as your Ambassador.

He went through the same process that anyone else does, who achieves DV. Same checks, same interviews etc.

In his case, this involved a second interview (on 24 Jan 2025) to confirm a couple of details that UKSV wanted to verify.

UKSV then informed the FCDO of their recommendation in the last week of January.

On 29 Jan 2025, FCDO (as decision maker) granted the DV certificate (for 5 years rather than 7). This shorter tenure was an FCDO decision owing to our expectations of a HoM posting being maximum 4-5 years.

PUSPO also sent a conflict of interest form to Lord M in January 2025.

I have not discussed here the content of his vetting file. Obviously we can do so with the right person(s) but I would note that vetting is an 'in confidence' process and candidates have a right to assume their information will be properly protected.

Owing to him being a high-profile individual, his case file has been placed into special handling. This basically means that anyone with access to the UKSV casework system cannot by default see the file. Special permissions would need to be granted by UKSV themselves.

Hope that is all useful.
