Geographical Names Policy

Recommended geographical names are those taken from official Greek sources and romanized according to the BGN/PCGN approved romanization system¹ (see page 3). English conventional names, where they exist, may be used in addition or instead of romanized Greek names according to context. Please contact PCGN for more details.

Country name

The modern Demotic² country name in Greek is Ελλάδα = *Elláda*. The pre-1976 official *katharévousa* name - Ἑλλάς or Ελλάς = *Ellás* - is still commonly encountered on cartographic products and in more formal contexts (and this *katharévousa* form may sometimes be encountered as *Hellas*).

Languages

The official language of Greece is Modern Greek; the Demotic form was made the sole official version in 1976 (see below for background). There are minor differences in dialect, some local (e.g. Cretan) and some dating from the population exchange with Turkey in the 1920s, which saw the integration of almost a million people whose families had been separated from Greece for centuries. In some villages in the south-eastern Peloponnese, the Tsakonian

(Greek: *Tsakónika*) dialect of Greek (or language closely related to Greek) is still spoken, but only by a few hundred mostly elderly people.

Other linguistic minorities are being assimilated into Greek. Albanians settled in Greece over a period of centuries and their descendants lived mostly in mountain villages on the mainland (including the Peloponnese). They are called in Greek Αρβανίτες = *Arvanítes* and their dialect of Albanian is Αρβανίτικα = *Arvanítika*, but Arbëresh in Albanian. Most now speak Greek. These are distinct from Albanian immigrants since the early 1990s.

The Vlachs of the Pindos Mountains in the northern mainland are also losing their language, which is akin to Romanian.

Small minorities of Bulgarian and Turkish speakers remain in the Thrace (*Thráki*) region of north-eastern Greece.

Writing system

Modern Greek, like Ancient Greek, uses the Greek alphabet which has changed little in well over two thousand years. A spelling reform in 1982 simplified the accent system (diacritics), reducing the diacritics marking stress from three to one.

Language and transliteration

For much of the twentieth century, place names in Greece posed a variety of challenges for the toponymist. Numerous small villages had had their names changed up to the 1950s; two forms of the Modern Greek language existed; several transliteration systems were in use – none universally or consistently; and accurate, large-scale modern maps were not available. These issues could combine to create multiple names or spellings for single places. By the early 21st century, systems had been standardised and better, consistent sources, such as <https://geodata.gov.gr>, are now available. Some of these difficulties are discussed below in more detail.

Differing forms of the Greek language

Over a period of more than two thousand years, the Greek language diverged considerably from that of the classical writers such as Homer, Herodotus and Aristotle. Spelling, pronunciation and vocabulary had all mutated, in part because of the influence of other languages such as Turkish, Albanian and Bulgarian. The resulting commonly spoken form of Greek is called Demotic (Greek: Δημοτική = *Dimotikí*). The growth of nationalism in the late 18th century, culminating with the war of independence in the 1820s, encouraged the development of a deliberately archaised form of Greek, called Καθαρεύουσα = *Katharévousa* (Greek for “purified”). For 150 years, these two forms of Greek existed in parallel, with disputes between their proponents occasionally leading to violence. The dispute had political overtones, with the Demotic and *Katharévousa* camps typically equating to Left and Right. Demotic was spoken by most, but was not often written nor used in education; a role filled by *Katharévousa*.

The Government of Greece made the decision in 1976 to abandon *Katharévousa* for official use, following the fall of the military dictatorship in 1974. Since then, *Katharévousa* has been

little used outside churches, though it took until at least the 1990s for Demotic to appear on maps to a significant degree.

An additional spelling reform was made in 1982. The diacritics marking stress were reduced from three to one, and a sign (an inverted apostrophe) at the beginning which indicated an H in Ancient Greek (but silent in both varieties of modern Greek) was abandoned.

As far as place names are concerned, the two forms of Greek usually differ slightly or not at all, and the change only affects the last few letters of a name. Loss of final –n in Demotic is very common.

Transliteration

The history of transliteration of Greek into a romanized form is long and complex. Names of places, people and gods in the history or mythology of Ancient Greece are typically rendered into English using Latin forms. This is usually not appropriate for place names or personal names in modern Greece.

The Greek Organisation for Standardisation (romanized Greek acronym: ELOT from Ελληνικός Οργανισμός Τυποποίησης) issued a revised system in 1983 (called ELOT 743) which was introduced in stages and has, since the late 1990s, been accepted by the Greek Government, the UN, BGN and PCGN as the standard system for Modern Demotic Greek in Greece. It is very widely used on road signs in Greece as well as printed guide books, and some online texts - more so than any previous system (note however that at the time of writing [April 2020] place names in Wikipedia and on Google Earth are not romanized consistently).

Changes in the transliteration systems have overlapped (co-incidentally) with the change from *Katharévousa* to Demotic. ELOT 743 post-dates the *Katharévousa*-Demotic change by some years, so a *Katharévousa* word in ELOT 743 transliteration should not occur except retrospectively, but Demotic romanization in a variety of ways is likely, though less so with the passage of time.

The ELOT 743 system of 1983, [adopted by BGN and PCGN in 1996](#), is more accurately reversible than the older 1962 system previously used by BGN and PCGN, but is a less reliable guide to Modern Greek pronunciation.

In the remainder of this document, Greek words are given in Demotic form with ELOT 743 transliteration, unless otherwise stated. Transliterations from Greek (or other scripts) are in *italics*.

Inventory of characters

The ELOT 743 transliteration system, adopted by PCGN in 1996, includes 23 letters of the Roman alphabet (not J, Q or W). C appears only in the combination *ch* (pronounced as in Scottish “loch”). Six vowels (a,e,i,o,u and y) can have an acute accent; in fact there must be one (and only one) accent on any word with two or more syllables; this denotes the stress and appears over the vowel of the stressed syllable of words in lower-case letters. It is not usually used on words written entirely in capitals, however, which sometimes makes identifying the stress difficult. If a word begins with an accented vowel, the acute accent is written on the left side of the first letter (eg Ἄρτα or Ἡπειρος). In transliteration the acute accent should be shown above the vowel – Árta, Ípeiros. Some Greek vowels can also be written with a diaeresis (two dots), but only after another vowel (so never initially).

Administrative structure

Since 2011, the top four levels of administration and local government in Greece are as follows (Mount Athos (the Holy Mountain) is an autonomous district that does not fit into this structure, but is detailed below under the Regions). Maps illustrating this information are available here: https://www.geogreece.gr/divisions_en.php

First level

Seven “Decentralised administrations”. Greek: Αποκεντρωμένη Διοίκηση = *Apokentroméni dioikisi*. Plural αποκεντρωμένες διοικήσεις = *Apokentroménes dioikíseis*. Their names are simply combinations of the Regions in the second level. These decentralised administrations would not be considered the first administrative level divisions and would not usually be shown on an administrative map.

Second level – considered first level of administration (ADM1)

There are thirteen Regions and it is these administrative regions that would usually be shown on a map. Region in Greek is Περιφέρεια = *Periféreia*. Plural Περιφέρειες = *Periféreies*.

Five of the Decentralised administrations are formed of two or more “Regions” The areas of the regions of Attica and Crete each form their own ‘Decentralised administration’.

Third level

Regions are divided into 74 “Regional units”. Many of the Regional units approximate to the fifty or so *nomoi* (plural of *nomos*, translated as department, prefecture or “nome”) which had existed in Greece from the mid-19th century up to 2011. Regional unit in Greek is Περιφερειακή ενότητα = *Perifereiakí enótita*. Plural: Περιφερειακές ενότητες = *Perifereiakés enótites*.

Fourth level:

The Regional units are divided into 332 municipalities. Greek: Δήμος = *Dímos* Plural: δήμοι = *dímoi*.

Autonomous region

Mount Athos has been an autonomous district since 1927. It is geographically part of Central Macedonia. Mount Athos is an important centre of Eastern Orthodox monasticism, home to 20 monasteries. Only males are allowed to enter the region.

Place-name changes

Greece grew to its present territorial extent in seven stages from 1830 up to 1947. With each stage, Greece absorbed various ethnic and linguistic minorities inhabiting villages which often had non-Greek names. There was widespread official re-naming of these villages, especially in the 1920s after the exchange of population with Turkey, and in the 1950s after the Civil War of 1944-49. No large towns have been affected by these changes.

Greek and conventional English names

Many place names in Greece have conventional English equivalents. These may be a simplified form of the Greek name, or derived from Latin or Italian forms. Some are falling into disuse. Ancient sites are usually known in English by the conventional name, but a nearby village would typically be given its modern Greek name; e.g. Mycenae (ancient site); Μυκήνες = Mykínes (nearby currently populated place) and Tiryns (ancient site) Τίρυνθα = Tíryntha (currently populated place).

Road-sign policies

Road signs show destinations in Greek script, with a romanization or English translation where appropriate.

Street name policies

For street names, the practice is slightly different from road signs. The sign is in Greek script followed by an exact ELOT 743 transliteration, but without use of translated English terms. For example, the street name Vyronos is named after the English poet Byron, but it appears only in this romanized Greek form, a name barely recognisable to an English visitor.

Trans-national features (rivers, mountains etc.)

Some geographical features cross the boundaries between Greece and one or more neighbouring countries. They have slightly or completely different names in each country. Each name should only be used on the appropriate side of the international boundary, with no preference given to either.
