

Appendix 3: Surveys and Non-Participation

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1. Introduction

Activity and angler surveys were conducted to estimate catch and participation rates. Within these surveys, qualitative questions were used to collect additional data. This report details the findings from two qualitative questions included in the angler survey: reasons for non-participation and additional comments from surveyors. This report also provides examples of both the activity and angler surveys.

2. Activity survey

All surveyors and Citizen Scientist Volunteers completed activity surveys after completing their site visit. The survey was completed online and an example of the activity survey can be found in Section 4.

3. Angler survey

Angler interviews were completed via an online survey link. An example of the structure and questions of this survey can be found in Section 4. In addition to catch and participation questions, the angler survey included open-ended questions regarding non-participation and any additional comments. The following sections detail the evident themes from these questions.

3.1. Non-participation

Question 6 ('Please use the box below to say why you do not want to take this survey. If the angler does not give a reason, please put N/A.') was a mandatory question to complete upon refusal of an angler interview. Out of the 1582 submitted angler surveys, 169 did not participate. Despite a low refusal rate (10.6%), reasons for non-participation were cleaned and coded. 21 surveys were removed as no legible response was submitted ('N/A') and the remaining 148 were thematically coded. Answers were submitted as a direct angler quote or paraphrased by the surveyor and coded (Table 1).

Of the 148 responses, the most frequent reason for non-participation was that the angler was not interested (n=37). Comments such as 'Did not want to do a survey' and 'Wasn't interested' highlight this disinterest. 21.6% of respondents quoted not having enough time as their reason for non-participation (n=32). This includes anglers who were 'just about to pack up' or were in a hurry to

leave the site as their 'Parking ticket [was] about to run out'. Similarly, 8.8% were too busy to participate (e.g. 'Busy setting up') and 5.4% wanted to focus on their fishing (e.g. 'Just wanted to fish').

12 respondents also noted a perceived inexperience or low avidity (8.1%). Comments included: 'Only fishes occasionally' and 'Doesn't feel they have enough knowledge of sea fishing'. Additionally, language barriers were cited as reason for refusal (7.4%) as surveyors noted some anglers 'Spoke little English'.

The least frequently referenced reason was a distrust or dislike of the government (n=4). These comments included: 'Hates DEFRA' and 'Thought the project was government intrusion'. Other comments (n=13) provided were: 'Hadn't caught anything', 'Had severe autism' and 'Doesn't know his email address'.

conducted on competition days. Other frequently cited themes were negative changes in fish stock and concerns over commercial fishing (n=44). 'The problem is not among the leisure fishing, the problem is on commercial fishing as they destroyed the sea bed and most of the population'. This suggests some anglers think sustainably maintaining fish stock is the responsibility of commercial rather than recreational angling. However, some anglers (n=4) noted concerns over what other recreational anglers keep, suggesting they do not adhere to restrictions and guidelines. For example, one surveyor noted:

'He does not agree with the people keeping so much mackerel when it's coming to shore. He's seen around Newhaven and Eastbourne people catching a lot and nobody cares. He remembers one day just after the pandemic period when he seen a few guys caching about 10-12 big sacks (100-150 liters) of mackerel in one evening. He challenged them and argued but no success, they said they will give it to friends and families and the rest will sell it. This is disgusting'.

Comments such as this evidence anglers' concerns with fish stock and also their awareness and compliance with regulations.

3.2.1. Information on Angler(s)

Of the 193 responses with information on anglers, 22 themes were identified with 229 references. 10.5% of responses related to competition anglers (n=24), which was the most frequent response. Collectively, comments on sea angling experience (frequent angler, infrequent angler, long-term angler, and new to sea fishing) were referenced 60 times (26.2%). Comments included: 'Just started, doesn't fish often', 'Very experienced angler', and 'A beginner at sea angling but has been coarse angling for 34 years'. Motivations for fishing (n=14) and mental health and wellbeing (n=10) were also referenced. Motivations included 'Just likes to be out and enjoy the weather' and 'Angling is social for him and likes to get out with friends'. Comments relating to mental health described angling as an activity that 'destresses' and provides a 'release'. All codes can be found in Table 2.

3.2.2. Feedback from Angler(s)

Out of 83 comments providing feedback from anglers, 14 themes were identified with 92 references. 26.1% of references related to a negative change in fish stock (n=24) and 20.7% concerned commercial fishing (n=19).

Comments on commercial fishing included: 'Commercial fishing take too many undersized', 'Chinese fishermen seem to be taking vast quantities of undersized fish for commercial gain', and 'Control commercial quotas and don't waste any catch'. There were also 8 references to positive changes to fish stock such as 'Sea bass control seems to be working' and 'I believe fish stocks are improving'. All themes for anglers' feedback can be seen in Table 3.

3.2.3. Information on Fishing Session

Of 50 responses providing information on the fishing session taking place, 16.7% referenced the location (n=10), such as 'Fishing from cliff top due to old age' and 'Came to this venue to avoid the crowds on a Sunday morning'. Comments on what anglers had caught during their session were also more frequently referenced (13.3%). These responses provided further information on the catches reported in the survey, such as 'The Bass he caught was his PB and weighed 2.4lb'. Other comments provided additional information on the session, including: 'Took an early session before the swimmers take over' and 'Up all night angling catching bait'. All codes can be found in Table 4.
