**Discretionary Advice Service (Charged Advice): DAS A024337
Development proposal and location: MOD Bicester**

Thank you for your consultation on the above dated 21 May 2026, which was received on the same day.

Protected sites

Bicester HRA Report

I note that the Bicester HRA Report has screened the proposal to check for the likelihood of significant effects on internationally protected wildlife sites.

The assessment concludes that the proposal can be screened out from further stages of assessment because significant effects are unlikely to occur, either alone or in combination. On the basis of the information provided, I can confirm that Natural England concurs with this view.

Bicester PEA Report Further Information Required- Arncott Bridge SSSI.

From the information provided the proposal could have potential significant effects on Arncott Bridge Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI).

I note that the development is located 1.8 km from Arncott Bridge Meadows SSSI and that the PEA concludes that further information may be needed from Natural England regarding this matter. I confirm that Natural England will need to be consulted with further information regarding hydrological impact pathways between the application site and the SSSI, in order to determine the significance of these impacts and the scope for mitigation.

Please re-consult Natural England once this information has been obtained.

Protected species

I note that the proposed site includes as presented, has the potential to affect species protected under European or UK legislation. Please see **Annex 1** for information regarding licensing for the following European Protected Species:

Natural England has produced [Standing Advice](#) which is available on its website. Whilst this advice is primarily designed to assist local planning authorities better understand the information required when assessing the impact of developments upon protected species, it also contains a wealth of information to help applicants ensure that their applications comply with good practice guidelines and contribute to sustainable development. In particular I would draw your attention to the flow chart which gives guidance on the species that are likely to be present on the application site based upon readily identifiable habitat features. Please refer to this Standing Advice for further information on what information the authority may require in terms of survey and mitigation proposals.

Annex 1

European Protected Species

A licence is required in order to carry out any works that involve certain activities such as capturing the animals, disturbance, or damaging or destroying their resting or breeding places. Note that damage or destruction of a breeding site or resting place is an absolute offence and unless the offences can be avoided (e.g. by timing the works appropriately), it should be licensed. In the first instance it is for the developer to decide whether a species licence will be needed. The developer may need to engage specialist advice in making this decision. A licence may be needed to carry out mitigation work as well as for impacts directly connected with a development. Further information can be found in Natural England's ['How to get a licence'](#) publication.

If the application requires planning permission, it is for the local planning authority to consider whether the permission would offend against Article 12(1) of the Habitats Directive, and if so, whether the application would be likely to receive a licence. This should be based on the advice Natural England provides at formal consultation on the likely impacts on favourable conservation status and Natural England's [guidance](#) on how the three tests (no alternative solutions, imperative reasons of overriding public interest and maintenance of favourable conservation status) are applied when considering licence applications.

Natural England's pre-submission Screening Service can screen application drafts prior to formal submission, whether or not the relevant planning permission is already in place. Screening will help applicants by making an assessment of whether the draft application is likely to meet licensing requirements, and, if necessary, provide specific guidance on how to address any shortfalls. The advice should help developers and ecological consultants to better manage the risks or costs they may face in having to wait until the formal submission stage after planning permission is secured, or in responding to requests for further information following an initial formal application.
