Whereas NEO NEXT+ ENERGY E&P UK LIMITED has made an application dated 26th August 2026, under The Offshore Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Unloading and Storage (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 2020, and whereas the Secretary of State has considered the application and is satisfied that the project is not likely to have a significant effect on the environment; in exercise of the powers available under regulation 6, the Secretary of State hereby directs that the application for consent in respect of the project need not be accompanied by an Environmental Impact Assessment, provided that the project is carried out as described in the application for the screening direction and in accordance with the conditions specified in the attached schedule.

In giving a screening direction under regulation 6 of the above Regulations, the Secretary of State accordingly gives agreement to the Oil and Gas Authority to the grant of consent for the project as detailed in the application, WONS/18999/0/IDA/1 Version 1.

SCHEDULE OF SCREENING DIRECTION CONDITIONS

The grant of this screening direction is conditional upon the screening direction holder complying with the following conditions.

1 Screening direction validity

The screening direction shall be valid from 1 September 2026 until 1 December 2027.

2 Commencement and completion of the project

The holder of the screening direction must notify the Department for Energy Security & Net Zero (hereinafter called the 'Department') of commencement and completion of the project within two days:

- a) of commencement of the project and
- b) of completion of the project.

3 Prevention of pollution

The holder of the screening direction must ensure that appropriate measures are taken to minimise discharges, emissions and waste, in particular through the appropriate use of technology; and to ensure that necessary measures are taken to prevent incidents affecting the environment or, where they occur, to limit their consequences in relation to the environment.

4 Inspections

Should the Department consider it necessary or expedient for an inspector appointed by the Secretary of State to investigate whether the conditions of the screening direction are being complied with, the holder of the screening direction shall afford the inspector with such facilities and assistance as the inspector considers necessary to exercise the powers conferred by the regulations. The holder of the screening direction shall additionally ensure that copies (electronic or paper) of the screening direction and any other relevant documents are available for inspection by the inspector at:

- a) the premises of the holder of the screening direction; and

b) the facilities undertaking the project covered by the screening direction.

5 Check monitoring

Should the Department consider it necessary or expedient to undertake an independent monitoring programme to assess the impact of the project covered by the screening direction, the screening direction holder shall afford the Department with such facilities and assistance as the Department considers necessary to undertake the work.

6 Atmospheric emissions returns

Following completion of the project covered by the screening direction, the holder of the screening direction shall report all relevant atmospheric emissions, such as combustion emissions, extended well test emissions or flaring and venting emissions relating to a well test, using the appropriate Environmental Emissions Monitoring System (EEMS) reporting forms. In the case of atmospheric emissions relating to drilling projects undertaken from a fixed installation, they should be included in the annual EEMS reporting forms for the fixed installation.

7 Unauthorised deposits

Following completion of the project covered by the screening direction, the holder of the screening direction shall recover any materials accidentally or temporarily deposited on the seabed, such as debris, temporary containers, structures or deposits, or scientific instruments, and shall return the materials to land. If it is not possible to recover any of these deposits, full details of the materials remaining on the seabed must be reported to the Department in accordance with the requirements of Petroleum Operations Notice No.2 (PON2).

8 Screening direction variation

In the event that the holder of the screening direction proposes changes to any of the particulars detailed in the application for a screening direction, the holder must notify the Department immediately and submit an application for a post screening direction amendment. The post screening direction must be in place prior to the amended proposals taking effect.

SCHEDULE OF SCREENING DIRECTION DECISION REASONS

The Secretary of State has decided that, based on the information provided, the project is not likely to have a significant effect on the environment. The main reasons for this decision are:

1) Decision reasons

The following provides a summary of the assessments undertaken by OPRED.

To determine whether an Environmental Impact Assessment is required for this project.

This document summarises the information considered, the potential impacts and sets out the main reasons for the decision made.

In considering whether an Environmental Impact Assessment is required or not, The following have been taken into account:

- a) The information provided by the developer;
- b) The matters listed in Schedule 5 of The Offshore Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Unloading and Storage (Environmental Impact Regulations 2020) (the Regulations);
- c) The results of any preliminary verifications or assessments of the effects on the environment of the project; and
- d) Any conditions that the Secretary of State may attach to the agreement to the Grant of consent.

Characteristics of the Project

Having regard, in the particular, to the matters identified at paragraphs 1(a) to (g) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the characteristics of the project include the following:

Summary of the Project

The project is the drilling of the 22/30c-EIJ development well from the Shelf Drilling Fortress jack-up rig at Elgin Wellhead Platform B. The proposed operations covered by this screening direction relate to Part 1 of the well programme, comprising the top-hole sections only, with rig arrival scheduled for 1 September 2026 and well spud planned for 10 September 2026.

- A 36" top-hole section will be drilled from mudline to 262 m MDBRT using seawater and Hi-Vis sweeps, riser-less, with drilling fluid and cuttings deposited at the seabed.

- A 30" conductor will be cemented and set at 252 m MDBRT. The 26" section will then be drilled using Polymer KCL Water Based Mud, with the 20" casing cemented in place using a cement stinger system.

- Water-based mud and cuttings from the 26" section will be returned to the rig via a riser, with mud separated for reconditioning and reuse and dry cuttings discharged overboard via the shale shakers.

Description of the Project

The Elgin Franklin Further Development Environmental Statement D/4111/2011 covered the installation of Elgin Wellhead Platform B and developmental drilling including infill wells. This screening direction considers the proposed 22/30c-EIJ development well top-hole drilling scope.

The project is to drill the 36" and 26" top-hole sections of the 22/30c-EIJ well using the Shelf Drilling Fortress mobile offshore drilling unit at Elgin Wellhead Platform B.

The 36" section will be drilled riser-less with seawater and Hi-Vis sweeps, with cuttings deposited at the seabed. The 26" section will be drilled with Polymer KCL water-based mud, with cuttings discharged overboard following separation via the shale shakers.

No cumulative impacts are expected to occur with any other existing or approved projects.

There is not likely to be any significant impact of the project on population and human health. It is not considered likely that the project will be affected by natural disasters.

As only the upper sections of the proposed well will be drilled and no entry into the reservoir will occur, a loss of well control is not considered possible for this phase. The principal accidental hydrocarbon risk is a diesel spill during bunkering or rig operations, which is expected to evaporate quickly and is not expected to present a significant environmental risk.

Other than the matters considered further below, there is not likely to be any significant impact of the project on population and human health.

Location of the Project

Having regard, in particular, to the matters identified at paragraphs 2(a) to (c) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the environmental sensitivity of geographical areas likely to be affected by the project has been considered as follows:

The proposed drilling project is located at Elgin Wellhead Platform B in the Elgin field, Central North Sea, Block 22/30c, approximately 224 km east of the Scottish mainland and 34 km from the UK/Norway median line. The water depth is approximately 93 m, the annual mean wave height in the area is 2.11-2.40 m, and residual currents are



approximately 0.14 m/s.

The seabed in the Elgin field area is predominantly muddy sand with occasional patches of sand and slightly gravelly muddy sand. Previous surveys recorded evidence of existing oil and gas disturbance, including cuttings piles, spud can depressions, trawl and anchor scars and disturbed sediments. No potential Annex I habitats were identified, although offshore subtidal sands and gravels and low densities of ocean quahog have been recorded in the wider area.

There are two protected sites in the vicinity of the Elgin field: the East of Gannet and Montrose Fields NC MPA approximately 13 km away and the Fulmar MCZ approximately 45 km away. The project is within the Scottish National Marine Plan area.

Atlantic white-sided dolphin, common dolphin, harbour porpoise, minke whale and white-beaked dolphin have been recorded in the vicinity of the Elgin field. Harbour and grey seals may be encountered from time to time, but the area is not expected to be used by seals with any regularity or in significant numbers.

Seabird sensitivity in Block 22/30 is low throughout the year, with no data available for November. The operations are located approximately 224 km offshore and are therefore remote from sensitive coastal seabird breeding areas.

The proposed operations will coincide with spawning and/or nursery activity for a range of fish and shellfish species including cod, lemon sole, mackerel, Norway lobster, Norway pout, sandeels and whiting. Fishing activity in ICES rectangle 43F1 is below the UKCS average and is mainly associated with demersal species.

There are several oil and gas installations and pipelines in the wider vicinity. The nearest submarine cable is approximately 9 km from the proposed operations. There are no Ministry of Defence practice areas in the vicinity. The closest windfarm is the Cenosis windfarm, currently in pre-planning, approximately 16 km northwest of the proposed operations; the Culzean Offshore Floating Wind Turbine Pilot Project is approximately 19 km northeast.

The INTOG E2 lease area is approximately 92 km from the proposed operations, and Elgin is located within INTOG area E-a where projects targeting oil and gas decarbonisation are being considered.

Shipping activity in the area is moderate, with vessel traffic associated with nearby oil and gas infrastructure and support vessel movements.

Given the location of the project, it is not likely that the areas identified at paragraphs 2(c)(i), (iii), (iv), (vi), (vii) of Schedule 5 to the Regulations will be affected by the project.

Type and characteristics of the potential impact

In accordance with paragraph 3 of Schedule 5 to the Regulations, the likely significant effects of the project on the environment have been considered. Potential effects on the environment from the activities associated with the project were assessed, including impacts arising from atmospheric emissions, seabed disturbance, physical presence, planned discharges and accidental spills. Other than the matters considered further below, there is not likely to be any significant impact of the project on population and human health.

The well will be drilled from the Shelf Drilling Fortress jack-up rig positioned alongside Elgin Wellhead Platform B, within the existing 500 m safety exclusion zone. Given the established exclusion zone, moderate shipping activity, and below-average fishing effort in ICES rectangle 43F1, impacts on other users of the sea are not considered significant.

The project will result in a localised area of seabed disturbance associated with spud can placement, pre-laid anchors, mooring chains and lines, a small cement patio and deposition of 36" section drill cuttings. Ocean quahog have been recorded in low densities in surveys within the Elgin field, and offshore subtidal sands and gravels are present in the wider area. While some localised mortality or smothering of benthic individuals may occur, the area of impact is small relative to the available seabed and significant effects at population level are not expected. No Annex I habitats have been recorded within the area.

Discharge of offshore chemicals associated with water-based mud drilling, cementing, the proposed cement trial, routine cement clean-up and any potential aborted cement discharge has been assessed and is not considered likely to have a significant effect on the environment. The majority of products are PLONOR, OCNS E category or Gold HQ band chemicals, with discharges expected to dilute and disperse rapidly.

Fish, marine mammals, seabirds and benthic species, including Priority Marine Features and European Protected Species where present, are not considered likely to be significantly impacted. Routine drilling and vessel noise is not expected to result in significant adverse effects.

The emissions associated with these drilling operations may result in short-term deterioration of local air quality within the vicinity of the well location; however, in the exposed offshore environment, emissions are expected to disperse rapidly and are not considered likely to have a significant impact. CO₂e emissions from the operation of the rig and support vessels are estimated to be approximately 1,857 tonnes, representing approximately 0.010% of annual emissions associated with UK offshore activities.

There are no expected transboundary effects from the planned drilling operations. The nearest boundary, the UK/Norway median line, is located approximately 34 km east of the operations.

As only the upper sections of the well will be drilled during this phase and no entry



into the reservoir will occur, a well blowout is not considered possible. The principal accidental hydrocarbon risk is a diesel spill, which is expected to evaporate quickly and present no significant environmental risk. Control measures will be in place to minimise the likelihood of accidental chemical releases.

The drilling operations are in accordance with the National Marine Plan for Scotland's objectives and policies. It is considered that the drilling of the 22/30c-EIJ top-hole sections is not likely to have a significant impact on other offshore activities or other users of the sea, and no significant cumulative impacts are expected.

Decision

Taking the above considerations into account, the Secretary of State has Concluded that the project is not likely to have a significant impact on the environment and that an environmental impact assessment is not required.
