

Pacific Islands

The term ***Pacific Islands*** refers to the island countries and territories of the tropical Pacific Ocean, commonly grouped into the three major cultural regions of Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia. These regional groupings are not defined consistently across all sources. The groupings used in this Factfile follow common UN and FCDO usage. Some states and territories may be associated with more than one region; for example, Kiribati is often described as being in both Micronesia and Polynesia.

This factfile is split into three parts, one for each of the sub-regions with the following states and territories: **Melanesia** (Fiji, New Caledonia, Norfolk Island, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, West Papua/Papua Provinces), **Micronesia** (Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Marshall Islands, Wake Island, Federated States of Micronesia, Palau, Naoero) and **Polynesia** (Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, Niue, Tokelau, French Polynesia, Hawaii, Kiribati, New Zealand, Wallis and Futuna, American Samoa, Pitcairn Islands, Rotuma, Easter Island, Nihoa-Midway-Johnston).

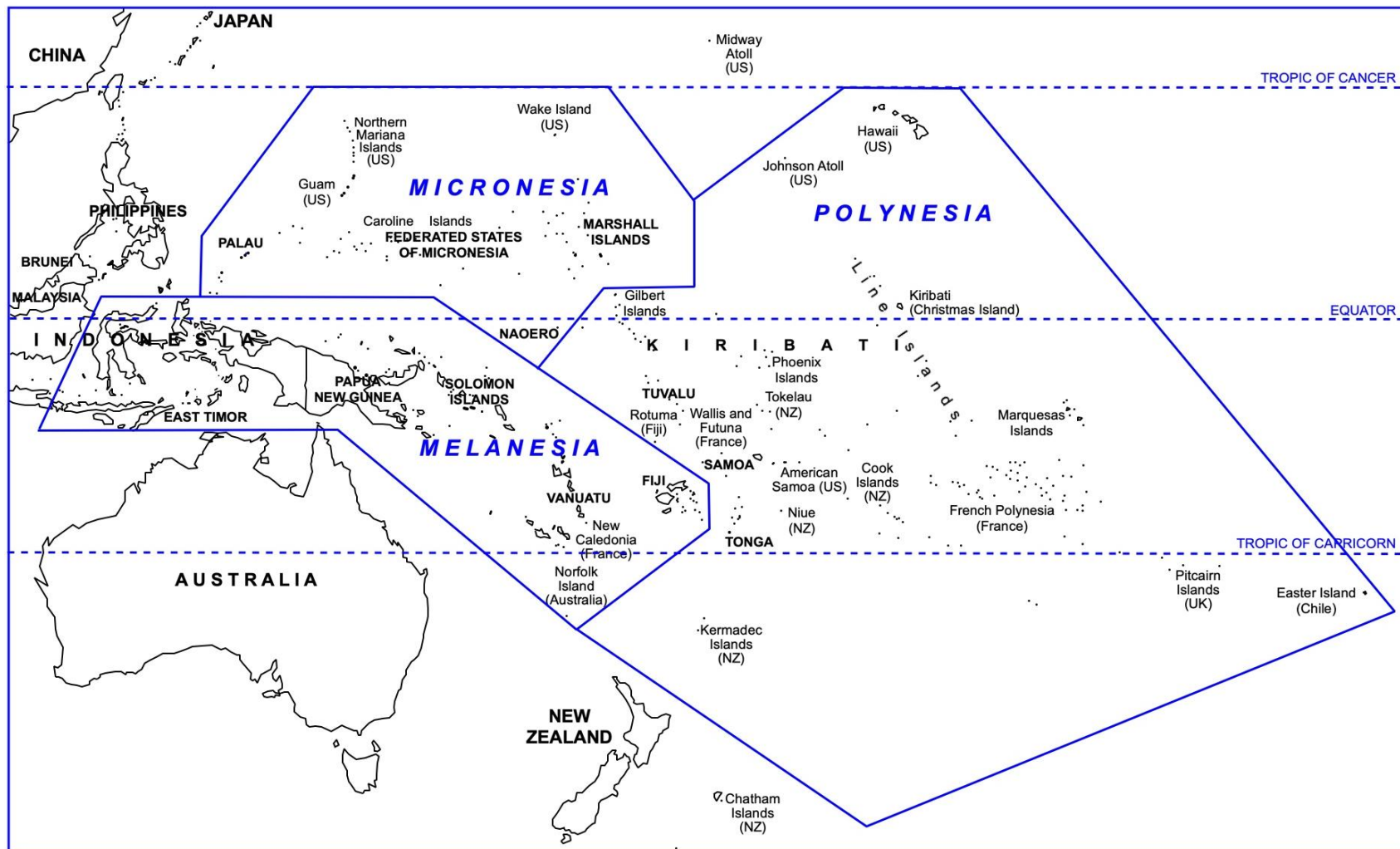
Within the Pacific region there are around 25,000 islands - more than half of the world's total. The Pacific stretches approximately 16,000 kilometres along the equator, and about 15,000 kilometres from north to south. The region includes independent states, self-governing territories in free association with larger states, and several non-self-governing territories administered by France, the United States, the United Kingdom and New Zealand. The Pacific Islands Forum comprises 18 members: Australia, Cook Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Fiji, French Polynesia, Kiribati, Naoero, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Niue, Palau, Papua New Guinea, Republic of Marshall Islands, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu, and Vanuatu.

Languages

Roughly 20 percent of the world's six to seven thousand languages are found in the Pacific Islands, which contain less than 1 percent of the world's land mass and population. The 1,300 or so distinct languages spoken by the indigenous peoples of the Pacific Islands belong to over 20 unrelated families.

Most island languages use the Roman script, and many incorporate macrons or apostrophes (typically denoting vowel length and glottal stops') as part of their standard orthography. English and French are the most widespread official languages, though indigenous languages are co-official in several countries (e.g. Bislama in Vanuatu, Samoan in Samoa, Tahitian in French Polynesia). PCGN generally recommends using the official locally-approved forms of names, including diacritics where these appear in government sources, while recognising long-established English conventional names where still in international use.

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Melanesia

The term Melanesia derives from the Greek *melas* (“black”) and *nesos* meaning “islands”. It is predominantly in the southwest Pacific, from the island of New Guinea in the west, to Fiji in the east. It has some of the larger islands of the Pacific, is linguistically diverse, and most are independent states.

Micronesia

Micronesia derives from the Greek *mikros* ("small") and *nesos* ("islands"). It is in the northwest Pacific and contains around 2,000 small islands and atolls, several in free association with larger states. It has four main archipelagos: the Caroline Islands, the Gilbert Islands, the Mariana Islands and the Marshall Islands. There are long distances between the island groups, and there is considerable linguistic and cultural diversity, so although the term Micronesia is well-established, the region is more of a disparate grouping.

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Polynesia

Polynesia derives from Greek *poly* (“many” and *nesos* (“islands”). It is made up of over 1,000 islands over the central and southern Pacific, commonly defined by the triangle between Hawaii, New Zealand and Easter Island. It is geographically the largest of the areas, with distances between the island groups by far the greatest. Despite this, it is a culturally cohesive region with widespread dual naming and language revival.
